UMATILLA, April 8 (AP)—Celebration of ground breaking for McNary dam at the Columbia river site here April 15 will be planned to handle a crowd of up to 50,000 persons for the all-day program.

Cornelia M. McNary, widow of the late Oregon senator and republican vice presidential candidate, 1900, will turn the first shovel of earth which officially launches construction.

An aluminum shovel and the aluminum bucket in which the first earth will be placed, are to be presented to the Oregon Historical Society.

A parade in the morning will precede the dedication ceremony at 2 p. m. and a fire regatta, street dances and a river regatta display on the Washington state side of the river will be other features.
