Langley Collyer Found In Mansion

NEW YORK, April 9 (AP)—The body of 61-year-old Langley Collyer was found Wednesday in his dilapidated Fifth avenue house, in one of his own booby traps, his feet and legs gnawed by rats.

The body was found in the room where his blind brother, Homer, 65, was found dead of a heart attack March 21. Police had removed more than 100 tons of junk from the ancient house where the brothers had lived in seclusion since 1909.

Detectives said that the fact that his limbs had been gnawed by rats indicated that he must have died before Homer. The hunt for him had spread to nine states while his body lay within a few feet of that of his blind brother to whom he had devoted his life.

LONDON, April 9 (AP)—Henry A. Wallace said today he feared the Truman policy of lending money for what Wallace called "the political purpose of stopping Russian expansion" would establish during the next three months a pattern which might lead to war.

The former vice president of the United States fixed no date for a war crisis in his hypothesis, but he told more than 200 British and foreign newsmen in a news conference that he felt a sense of urgency in "watching these two great giants, America and Russia, getting ready for a death struggle."

Asked what specific action he recommended, Wallace said: "We should make clear that American power is being used to increase the productivity of the common man in peace all over the world instead of being used to divide the world into warring camps."

For his own role, Wallace said he felt he could not help the cause of peace by a trip to Russia now because "I would be under suspicion from both sides."

Wallace arrived yesterday for a two-week speaking tour of Britain, Scandinavia and France.
