

Truman Eyes Means To Cut Prices

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—President Truman said today that unless prices come down wage increases will be justified.

The president told a news conference the justice department is studying the question of whether manufacturing concerns can combine to lower prices without running afoul of the anti-trust laws.

Under one supreme court decision, Mr. Truman said, it would be unlawful to combine to cut prices just as it would be to group together to raise them.

Survey Conducted
The president said this survey is being conducted as one means of getting prices down since the government's power over prices ended last year and it would be impractical to reinstitute price controls.

Mr. Truman added that he does not believe the people want such controls.

The president said he feels there is no necessity for a recession.

He plans no message to congress on the situation, Mr. Truman said.

man said. Then he added with a smile that congress is getting plenty on this from the general public.

No Prosecution

When informed that many companies are afraid of violating the anti-trust laws if they combine to cut prices, the president replied that the department of justice could prosecute under the law, but if consulted about it there would be no prosecution.

He said he has telegrams from about half a dozen companies announcing price reductions and he is much gratified.

Doolittle Men Slate Reunion

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—Sixty-one of the 80 army air forces fliers who made the first air strike against Tokyo under the command of Jimmy Doolittle are alive to celebrate the fifth anniversary of the feat.

The AAF said today most of the men will attend a three-day reunion at Miami Beach beginning April 18, the date on which the 16 B-25 medium bombers made a precarious takeoff from the navy's aircraft carrier Hornet 800 miles east of Tokyo. Lt. Gen. Doolittle, now vice president of an oil company, plans to be present.

Of the 80 men and officers who flew the mission, 33 are still in the AAF.

Tule Hospital Site Sought

TULELAKE, April 10—E. L. Linton Stephens and J. J. Thomas, bureau of reclamation officials, were present Tuesday for the chamber of commerce meeting when the problem of a site for the proposed new hospital was taken up.

It has been suggested that the building be located on reclamation land south of the east-west road which the city seeks for an addition to the townsite.

The Tulelake Hospital association, a non-profit organization, was formed some time ago and it is proposed to sell non-assessable stock in the near future.

Temporary officers, who are present directors of the chamber of commerce, stated today that it will take \$40,000 to finance the venture. The hospital will serve the Tulelake area of Siskiyou and Modoc counties and will probably accommodate 20 patients.

The board of directors of the chamber include Don Potter, chairman; Clifton Hines, Clayton Rudesill, R. Rinabarger, Ivan Rose, Bruce Brickell, Rance Stover, Don Webster and Ray Moresco.

Dick Moore, Bob McClymonds and Sam Anderson are on the hospital committee.

Mrs. Judson To Die Friday

TEHACHAPI, Calif., April 10 (AP)—Mrs. Louise Peete Judson, 64, a woman about to die, kept reporters chuckling during her last interview.

The plump, matronly woman, twice convicted of murder, is scheduled to die in the San Quentin gas chamber at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The state will execute her for the murder of Mrs. Margaret Logan, her employer and benefactress, to whom she was paroled after serving 18 years of a life sentence for the slaying of Jacob Denton, Los Angeles engineer, in 1920.

Both victims were found in shallow graves. Mrs. Logan in the backyard of her Pacific Palisades home and Denton in the basement of his residence. Prosecuting attorneys asserted that Mrs. Judson killed both of them to gain possession of their property.
