Wartime Army Figures Given
WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—A total of 11,367,989 men and women served in the army between November 1, 1940 and July 31, 1946, the war department reported today.

The announcement reported army strength at 1,799,102 last July 31, and said 9,568,887 of those who entered service had been separated from duty. New York contributed 1,157,000 men and 24,741 women to lead all states in people in the army, while Nevada had the smallest number, 11,000 men and 317 women.

The figures for men and women (all in even thousands) included: Idaho, 39,000 and 799; Montana, 41,000 and 1216; Oregon, 81,000 and 2341; Washington, 125,000 and 3739; Alaska, 4300 and seven.

Longshoremen Ask Pay Hike

SAN FRANCISCO, April 10 (AP)—The CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union served notice today that it intends to seek higher wages "in all segments" of its jurisdiction.

Amount of increases to be asked will be determined by the various crafts within the union. A statement of policy adopted by the 200 delegates to the seventh biennial ILWU convention yesterday declared the drive for anti-labor legislation was aimed in part at preventing wage increases but that "the ILWU will not be scared off."

Another resolution denounced proposals to outlaw the communist party "or any other minority party." It was adopted by a 190 to 10 vote with the support of Harry Bridges, ILWU president. Seattle delegates led the opposition.

Keno Youth Serves In Tokyo

WITH THE EIGHTH ARMY IN TOKYO—Private Patrick C. Wilkins of Keno, Ore., is now serving with the famed fighting first cavalry division, which is on occupation duty in the ten prefectures of the Tokyo-Yokohama area. The first cavalry division fought all the way from Australia in the Pacific campaign of World War II, and was first in Manila and first in Tokyo.

A graduate of Klamath Union high school, Klamath Falls, Ore., Wilkins entered the army in October, 1946, and received his basic training at Fort Bragg, N. C.

PORTLAND, April 10 (AP)—Three Oregon men were en route to Alaska today to begin summer operation of river boats into the Yukon when the ice-bound craft are freed. Capt. Bill Maki and Capt. Allen Brown are due in Holy Cross, Alaska, and Chief Engineer R. W. Kern left for McGrath, Alaska.

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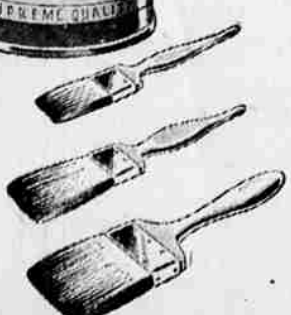
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
