Two persons known to have been together at Glazier, Tex., when the tornado struck were found dead three miles apart. Heavy highway construction equipment was twisted out of shape, buildings were gutted and only one in the town remained standing.

H. C. Carnahan, Woodward wholesale drug representative, said the storm struck with "a loud swishing noise, like the rush of escaping steam."

"We could see automobiles, barrels and merchandise of all kinds whipping up the street."

UN Delays Greek Action

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., April 10 (AP)—The United States demanded today that the security council defer action on a Soviet proposal which would place American aid to Greece under United Nations supervision.

Warren R. Austin, head of the U. S. delegation, in a long reply to Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko's attack on the Truman program, declared the council should take no action on the Soviet proposal until after congress had approved the administration plan and agreements had been reached between the United States and Greece and Turkey.

"We would then be in a position to judge calmly and objectively and in the spirit of unanimity which I hope will prevail in this council, the merits of the Soviet proposal," he said.

Golden Days Of Timber Industry Waning Rapidly

MEDFORD, April 10 (AP)—Southern Oregon timber industry representatives were told last night that "the golden days are waning" and organization is needed to meet future problems.

Carl Crow, Portland, editor of the Pacific Lumber Digest, said there are 121 mills in Jackson county, the lumber market is softening and mill owners must get together to improve their product and service if they wish to meet competitive conditions of the future.

H. J. Cox, Eugene, said the projected Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association was a sound move in which members had much to gain and nothing to lose.

Sawmill activity has boosted Jackson county's population 18,000 in four years. Glen Jackson, president of the county chamber of commerce and a mill owner, said. He asserted that operators, to keep this new population busy must undertake more manufacturing and must increase quality as the market demand shrinks.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 10 (AP)—Northern California and Nevada felt the four-day telephone strike with increasing severity today as CIO operators began about-face of policy and pledged support of picket lines established by the National Federation of Telephone Workers.
