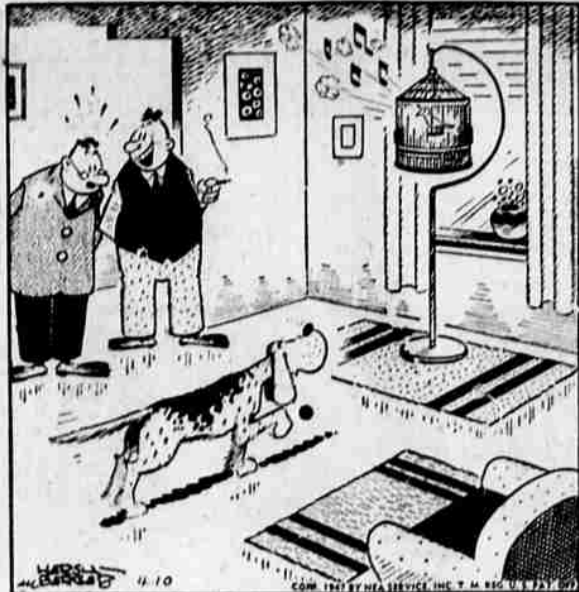

To The Patrons OF THE Klamath Bus Co.

The first paragraph of the Klamath Falls Central Labor Union's notice in Tuesday night's paper stated that most people are sympathetic with the working man, which is true. That is why the Klamath Bus Company has always paid more wages in the past and at the present time than any other truck driving job of similar category in Klamath County. In fact our scale has been approximately 10c per hour higher than the average Union contract with other local city truck drivers.

The Klamath Falls Central Labor Union states that they have made a thorough investigation of complaints of the Motor Coach Employees Union 1055. If they have made any investigation it definitely was one-sided, for no one has contacted the Klamath Bus Company for their story.

The Klamath Falls Central Labor Union assumes that we are unfair because we have discharged a driver who misappropriated Company funds; who was the cause in the past year of approximately one-third of all the accidents of our Company; and of all the drivers he was a man who would not obey Company rules.

In regard to the dispute with the Motor Coach Employees Union 1055 in May, 1945, the Klamath Bus Company did discontinue payment of dues to the Union due to the fact that the drivers, of their own free will, tore up the contract in the presence of the Union Representative, and each driver advised the Company to discontinue withholding any more dues from their paychecks from that day on.

Regarding drivers previous to May, 1945, we had the repeated difficulty of drivers quitting in the middle of a shift without even as much as calling the Company; in some cases leaving a bus load of passengers sitting on the street without a driver. With the present caliber of drivers the buses are on schedule, the drivers are courteous and far more careful, and we are having approximately 80 per cent less accidents than we have had in previous years.

Concerning a 40 Hour week, which this Company is accused of putting into effect if the drivers join the Union, can be answered in this respect. We have asked all the Union Representatives who have called on the Company previously regarding hours and wages if they could figure out a schedule where each man could work 8 hours per day, and in all instances after considerable figuring they have said "no." That is the reason we are working 9 hours per day, because we would have to work 4 1/2 hour shifts per day to make our schedules work, or 9 hours per day. It isn't our wish that the boys work 9 hours per day, but it is definitely impossible to figure any other work schedules unless they work 4 1/2 hours per day for 7 days plus split shifts.

May we at this time thank the riding public for their patronage. An example of Public sympathy we believe is shown by the increased number now riding the buses.
