

## D. C. Hagaar Dies At 74

D. Clark Hagaar, 74, for 27 years a resident of Klamath Falls, died at the Elks national home at Bedford, Va., yesterday, following a heart attack.

Mr. Hagaar, who was affectionately known by scores of friends as "Cy," had been residing at the home for the last two and one-half years. On April 7, he suffered a heart attack in the lobby of the home, and rallied only temporarily. At his request, burial will take place at Bedford.

For many years, Mr. Hagaar was engaged in the photography business here. He was connected with the Star Drug store for a long time, and later conducted a developing and printing business at the East Side pharmacy. He lived with Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Dunn of the East Side pharmacy for 18 years.

Born in Clymer, N. Y., as the son of a Methodist minister, Mr. Hagaar was trained as a pipe organist. He played for a time in church, but according to his story, he "put too much jazz in the offertory" and it was agreed that his career as an organist should end. He ran away from home and fought with Teddy Roosevelt in the Battle of San Juan hill in the Spanish-American war. Coming west, he went to work for Edward S. Curtis, photographer whose pictures of North American Indians won wide fame. He worked for Curtis in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Mr. Hagaar spent three years in Hawaii operating his own photography business. He came to Klamath Falls in 1920, and this was his official residence until his death. He was a prominent member of the Klamath Falls Elks lodge, and was official photographer for that club for a number of years.

## Bus Companies Face Charges

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—Attorney General Clark today announced the indictment of nine corporations and seven individuals on anti-trust charges of conspiracy in the sale of equipment to "a nationwide combine of city bus lines."

The indictment by a federal grand jury at Los Angeles alleges, Clark said, "conspiracy to restrain and monopolize domestic trade in violation of the anti-trust laws in the sale of buses, tires, tubes and petroleum products" to the bus lines controlled by National City Lines, Inc.

The statement added that National City Lines owned or controlled 47 local transportation systems in California, Missouri, Washington, Utah, Maryland, Alabama, Florida, Illinois, Oklahoma, Indiana, Iowa, Mississippi, Nebraska, Michigan, Texas and Ohio.

## Wheat Exports To Use Up Surplus

SPOKANE, April 10 (AP)—Exportation of wheat to foreign countries will use up any surplus of the northern Idaho and eastern Washington Palouse country, F. E. Smetheram, Spokane district manager of the department of commerce, said today.

The agency manager predicted that wheat granaries in the Palouse will be empty by the end of the 1947 wheat year.

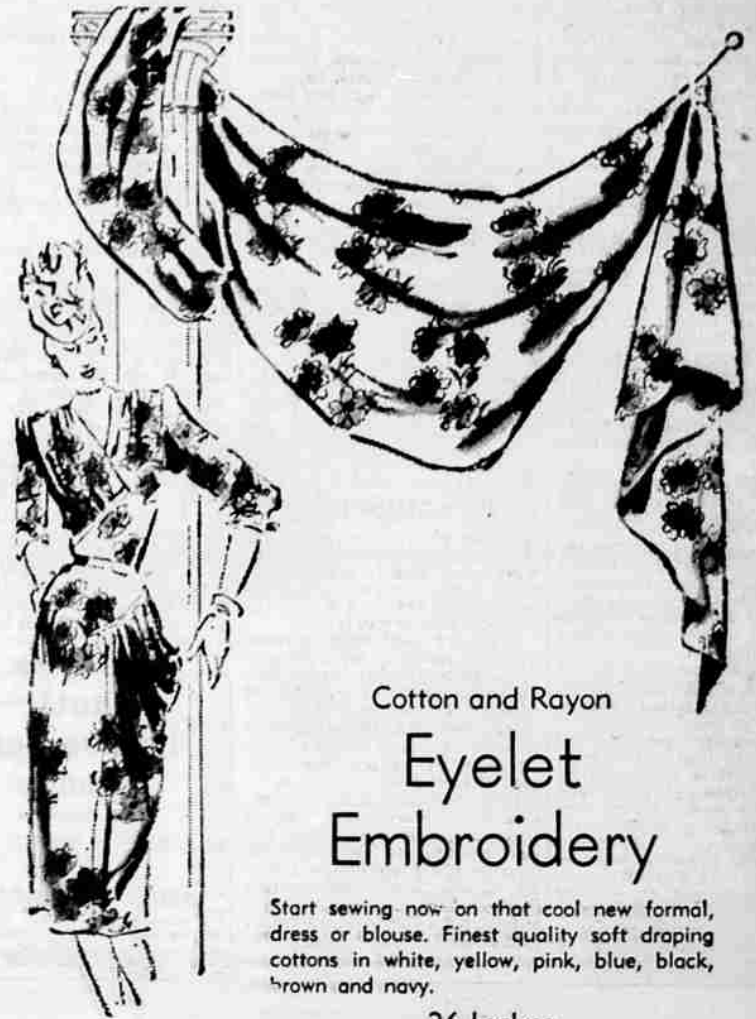
