

Atom Board Gets Down To Work

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—The atomic energy commission came out of its storm cellar today and plunged immediately into long range planning for peaceful and military development of nuclear power.

The tornado which roared about the commission during 11 weeks of argument on Capitol Hill subsided last night when the senate voted 50 to 31 to confirm David E. Lilienthal as the chairman's job he has held since last January 1. Four fellow commissioners and General Manager Carroll Wilson also were confirmed without the formality of roll calls.

Lilienthal made an oblique reference to the commission's difficulties in a terse victory statement in which he said "the important thing now is to get on with this job."

"This job" entails the outright ownership for the government of all atomic plants and materials in this country as well as sweeping authority over research and development work in all fields.

But while all six of President Truman's atomic nominations were approved, there are indications that the controversy may flare up again in the next few weeks. Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.), who opened the fight against Lilienthal, has indicated that he will demand searching scrutiny of the commission's funds.

Pollution Law Upheld

PORTLAND, Ore., April 10 (AP)—Oregon's river pollution regulations were defended in a statement by Harold Wendel, chairman of the state sanitary authority, in answer to a Washington state pollution commission report.

Wendel said "we believe Oregon has a pretty good pollution law, and as a matter of fact, we believe it is better than the Washington law which imposes a maximum penalty of \$100 a day, whereas the Oregon law requires that pollution be abated on order of the court."

Slimy mold conditions in the Columbia river were blamed in a Washington commission report on Willamette river pollution. Other Oregon officials said a joint Oregon-Washington study a few years ago found Vancouver-Washougal mills responsible for the Columbia river condition.

Freeze Put On Alaska Building

JUNEAU, Alaska, April 10 (AP)—A "freeze" order on all appropriations for the 1947-48 biennium except those essential to the operation of the territorial government, has been issued by the territorial board of administration. Attorney General Ralph Rivers disclosed today.

The action followed estimates that revenues for the biennium would fall an estimated \$3,750,000 short of the \$310,000,000 appropriated by the legislature, Rivers said.

Principal effect of the order will be to halt all new construction of schools, hospitals, roads, airfields, roads and small boat harbors. Road and airfield construction appropriations totaling

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\$400,000 were frozen by the order, but an estimated \$600,000 annual receipts from the two-cent-a-gallon motor fuel tax, earmarked for the roads, harbors and airfields fund, was unaffected.
