

Gillen Named 4-H Leader

Official notice of Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen's transfer and promotion is expected within a few days, County Agent Charles A. Henderson said today, announcing that Mrs. Gillen has been named assistant state 4-H club leader.

She will move to Corvallis some time in May and her daughter, Sheila, will enter junior high school there this fall.

Mrs. Gillen will be greatly missed by the many friends she has made since she came to Klamath county nine years ago as home demonstration agent for the state extension service. When she came here in 1938, this county was virgin territory for home economics work, and during her stay Mrs. Gillen has built up the work to its present status with 15 communities having organized extension units. Hundreds of homemakers have learned to depend on her for recipes, canning tricks, decorating suggestions, and interesting ideas in quick freezing methods and plans for remodeling farm homes.

Mrs. Gillen came to Oregon from Iowa where she received her master's degree in home management. She was the first regularly employed home demonstration agent in Klamath county.

Besides her activities with the extension service Mrs. Gillen has been an active member of the community, using her time and talents unstintingly to civic enterprises such as bond and salvage drives. She is a member of the Business and Professional Women's club, and the Methodist church where she sang in the choir, and is chairman of the Klamath County Concert association membership committee.

Navy To Hold Sub Broadcast

In keeping with the 47th anniversary of the U. S. navy's submarine service, April 11, Vernon Chittwood and L. J. Caillier, Klamath Falls navy recruiters, will broadcast a 15-minute talk over KFLW at 7:30 p. m. Friday.

It was April 11, 1900 when the U. S. navy bought a "submersible torpedo boat," from J. B. Holland for \$150,000, and this was the start of the navy's "silent service." This first submarine was 53 feet long, weighed 74 tons and once attained a speed of seven knots.

In their report talk the navy recruiters will explain formerly secret information regarding submarine patrols in World War II. The broadcast will follow the Gillette fights on KFLW.

Potato shipments from the Klamath basin for the 1946-47 season have topped shipments of the previous year, according to department of agriculture reports.

A total of 10,371 carloads has been shipped up to Wednesday this season, while only 10,345 carloads were shipped last year up to April 10.

A total of 10,716 carloads of potatoes were shipped from the basin during the 1945-46 season.

Henry Aaron Eglin was picked up by city police last night when they noticed faint smudges of blood on the rear of his car. He was arrested, however, for parking in a bus zone. Eglin was taken to the police station, where his car was searched and a dead deer found in the trunk.

State police were called and Eglin appeared in justice court this morning. He told Judge J. A. Mahoney that he hit the deer on the highway with his car, on Donner pass in California. He said he then put the deer in his car and continued on his way toward Portland. Somewhere along the route he stopped to bleed the animal, causing the stains noticed by the city police. He added that he had tried to get to Portland with the deer, but his car had broken down. The animal had begun to sour by the time police picked him up. Eglin was en route from Las Vegas, Nev., to Portland.

Considering his non-residence in the basin, and that the deer was not killed in this state, Judge Mahoney let Eglin off with the minimum fine of \$25 and court costs of \$7.20.

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"Ham" Contacts Tornado Area

Dave Beach, local Klamath Falls radio amateur and operator of station W7KCI, has been in touch by amateur stations in the tornado area of Texas and Oklahoma, according to word received by The Herald and News. Beach, a former Texas resident, reports that other stations are operating with emergency power supplies since commercial power lines are down over the area. Operators with whom Beach has been in contact report a heavy loss of farm equipment and stock in the disaster. Portable amateur radio equipment is furnishing virtually the only means of communication from the area, Beach said.

Lilienthal Gets Praise

SEATTLE, April 11 (AP)—Confirmation of David E. Lilienthal as chairman of the atomic energy commission was termed "good for the west" last night by Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.).

"Lilienthal favors a program which will require more power than is now available out here," Magnuson declared. "His appointment means that we should be able to present a strong case for installation of additional generators at Grand Coulee dam, and it gives some hope for at least token appropriations for McNary and Foster Creek dams."

Magnuson predicted the commission would push a program for use of the Oak Ridge, Tenn., plant for military aspects and the Hanford engineer works for commercial phases of atomic energy.

"That would be a tremendous break for Richland," he added.

Of Columbia basin appropriations, the senator termed the outlook in the house "extremely dark" with the main hope for ample monies coming in the senate.

Western GOP's Criticized

WENATCHEE, April 11 (AP)—The same dangers which opposed the desires of President Thomas Jefferson to develop the west are apparent in the "republican intentions" shown by the budget debates in congress, former U. S. Sen. Hugh B. Mitchell declared last night in a Jefferson Day address.

"Our welfare and progress hang on the whim of republican congressmen who do the bidding of eastern masters. They place a heavy discount on our aspirations," Mitchell declared.

"Men like Rufus Woods started 40 or more years ago to bring our destiny within the horizon. Is it now going to recede again into the dim future?" Mitchell described Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon as "able and distinguished" and praised his work in fighting for western interests.

"But by trying to make the republican party a vehicle of progressive policy, he makes himself a martyr to a hopeless cause. He pursues a course of political futility."

"... to him, I extend an invitation to join the democratic party."

Soviets Urge China Probe

LONDON, April 11 (AP)—The Moscow radio broadcast today what it said was an appeal by "a democratic group in the Kuomintang" urging the council of foreign ministers to investigate "American self-seeking policy in China."

The broadcast did not identify the "democratic group" further, did not mention any names of the "group" and did not indicate whether the statement had been or would be presented formally to the four foreign ministers now meeting in Moscow. (Recent dispatches from China have given no clue as to the identity of the so-called "democratic group").

The Kuomintang is the national people's or government party in China. It includes several factions.

Assault Count Conviction Given

SEATTLE, April 11 (AP)—Frank M. Staley, 33, also known as Walter Manas Woodward, was convicted yesterday by a superior court jury of one criminal assault and six attempted assaults against Seattle women.

Maximum penalty on each of the seven counts is 20 years imprisonment.

The jury of 11 men and one woman deliberated two hours. Staley, who jumped his \$3000 bond after his arrest here several years ago, was recaptured by federal agents in southern California on a charge of draft evasion and returned here for trial.

Midway in reading of the verdicts late yesterday, his mother, Mrs. Mae Woodward, 55, broke into sobs and was led weeping from the courtroom. His wife, Corinne, put an arm around his shoulders.

Among the women who testified against Staley was the wife of a Police field soldier.
