Man Confesses Torch Slaying

SEATTLE, April 11 (AP)—A full written confession to the "torch" slaying of a Houston, Tex., woman in September, 1945, has been made by Riley B. McCaine, 41, Harry G. Maynor, agent in charge of the Seattle FBI office, disclosed.

The confession, in which he gave no reason for the slaying, came less than 24 hours after McCaine's apprehension here by the FBI, Maynor said.

The FBI agent said McCaine admitted he choked the woman, Elinor Collins, 30, after an accidental meeting on a Houston street, then poured lighter fluid on her neck and set it afire to destroy the strangulation marks.

Health Talk Slated Here

A health talk by Dr. G. C. Bellinger of Salem will be the highlight of the annual dinner meeting of the Klamath Public Health association, set for Tuesday, April 15, at 6:30 p. m. in the Willard.

Dr. Bellinger's talk will deal with control of tuberculosis and the fundamental values of public educational work. The doctor has a wide knowledge of his subject, having been superintendent of the Oregon State TB hospital since 1912. He is a member of the council of the American Trudeau society, a member of the board of directors of the National Tuberculosis association, chief for tuberculosis division of the veterans administration, branch 11, in which capacity he is consultant for four states, including Oregon and Alaska.

Mrs. Bellinger will accompany her husband on his visit to Klamath Falls.

A special feature at the dinner will be two numbers by the KUHS boys' octet, under direction of Andrew Loney.

Timber Meet Open Saturday

The regular quarterly meeting of the Klamath Basin District Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers, AFL, will open Saturday in the Klamath Falls labor temple with a welcoming address by Chamber of Commerce President John Houston, according to Business Agent K. A. Gordon.

During the two-day meet, Gordon said, nominations will be made for officers for the coming year.

The meeting Saturday is scheduled to open at 9:30 a. m. with a registration of delegates. Following Houston's speech, he will be answered by Ned Austin, president of the District Council. The principal address of the morning will be delivered by G. C. Gupill, president of the Central labor council, who will be followed by C. E. Briggs from the Central Oregon labor council, and Al May from the Teamsters' union.

After lunch the delegates will be addressed by Joe Willis from the building trades, C. D. Long from the carpenter's union. An important address of the day will be that by Doyle (Bud) Pearson of the Oregon State council. Saturday's business will end with an introduction of visiting representatives and the reports of delegates.

Sunday morning at 10 a. m. the meeting will continue with reports of committees and business agents, old and new business, and the nominating of officers.

The Klamath Basin district council covers an area from Grants Pass, south to Yreka, to Alturas and north to Lakeview, comprising 21 local unions which hold the bargaining rights of from four to five thousand employees.

LA GRANDE, April 11 (AP)—La Grande will have parking meters by about July, according to Ed Ford, city manager. Present plans call for installation of approximately 375 meters which are expected to take in approximately \$20,000 annually, Ford said.

Oklahoma City Without Bus Lines

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 11 (AP)—Oklahoma City's 250,000 citizens awoke this morning to find themselves without bus or streetcar service after drivers refused to cross another union's picket lines around the car barn. Oklahoma Railway company drivers, reporting to take out early morning runs, found members of the Brotherhood of Railroad Train Men picketing. The ORC drivers are members of the Amalgamated Association of Motor Coach and Street Car Operators of America (AFL). BRT members are striking for higher wages against the Oklahoma Transportation company which is owned by the Oklahoma Railway company, operators of city service.

Farm Price Drop Seen

PULLMAN, Wash., April 11 (AP)—A drop of 25 to 30 per cent in the price of farm products was described by H. S. Cherry, New York economist, yesterday as both likely and desirable.

He told delegates to the annual Pacific Northwest Conference of Banking that 12 1/2 per cent of the national income now is going to purchase farm products as compared with 8 1/2 per cent in 1939, and added: "The farmer deserving credit is the one who is trying to cut his costs. Loans made to enable pyramiding of land holdings are unsound."

A different opinion was expressed by Dr. A. J. Guthrie of the Washington State college economics department, who asserted economic factors did not indicate a rapid drop in farm prices before the beginning of the next harvest season.
