It was a relief, to sit in the theatre and watch a performance that took you completely out of a world which has revolved around atomic control, strikes, disasters, floods and tornadoes.

Professional reviewers of the concert could toss in a lot of French phrases describing the toe work, the ballet technique and the degree of performance, but such simple terms as poignant beauty, artistic charm will have to suffice. Right now we must mention the costumes which were lovely and exciting all at the same time.

"Getting Ready" was the title of a very brief skit which introduced the four principals. It was a touch of comedy which the audience, holding back applause for reason of experience, accepted almost coldly. It was no long, however, until Svetlova, Roland, Imaz and Chiasson had that same audience in the palm of their hands as evidenced by the congregation backstage at the close of the performance.

It was probably this touch of comedy, evidenced in such numbers as the Buffoon dance by Roland, the Student Performance, the Gay Nineties dance and the final number, Flirtation Russian Style vs. American Style by Svetlova and Roland, as well as the play of Imaz and Chiasson, that convinced the audience that here were four flesh and blood artists who were having just a much fun as the audience.

The program was as varied as any given on the stage and every taste was satisfied whether you sat wrapt in the thrill of Svetlova's lovely and ethereal Dance of the Elf; Roland's romantic charm in the Viennese Waltz, Imaz' spirited Tang Flamenco, or Chiasson's magnificent interpretation of Debussy's Gardens in the Rain.

As for Chiasson, he could have carried a program all his own as far as piano lovers go.

Next week, on April 18, we have the pleasure of hearing Bidu Sayago, the Brazilian songbird. It remains to be seen even the lovely and talented Sayago can leave her audience as happy as Marina Svetlova, Robert Roland, Elena Imaz and Claude Chiasson, (Lois Stewart)
