Mrs. Smith showed examples of Mukluks. She told of the constant struggle against the effects of the intense cold of interior Alaska, mentioning specifically the water systems, highways and railroad beds. She said Alaska had become so air-minded that there were more landings in one day on one airfield than occurred in the same length of time at LaGuardia field.

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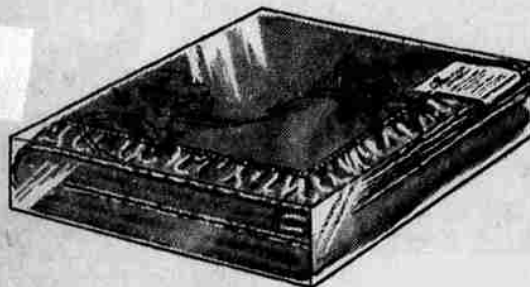
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
