McCarthy, in retirement since early last season, is reported not in the best of health and it is doubted whether he could be induced to take the job for even as much as one season. Terry is in private business in Memphis, Tenn., while Frisch is embarking on a job of broadcasting the Giants games this season.  
Immediate speculation centered on the Dodger coaches, Clyde Sukeforth, whom Rickey has appointed to serve as pilot "pro tem," Ray Blades, and Jake Pitler—none of whom are reported to be particularly anxious to step into the driver's seat.

# Zale-Graziano Title Fight May Be Set For June In Chi

CHICAGO, April 12 (AP)—Sam Pian, manager of Toy Zale, said today that "the way things look now, Zale probably will defend his middleweight championship in a rematch with Rocky Graziano some time this June in Chicago."  
Pian said he was planning to meet Irving Cohen, Graziano's manager, in Cleveland Tuesday and that they would go to New York "to try to reach a definite decision" on the encore.  
Pian began making more definite plans for the rematch after Graziano's application for his boxing license was denied yesterday by the New York state athletic commission. His license was revoked two months ago for failure to report a \$100,000 bribe offer.  
The Illinois athletic commission has indicated through its chairman, Sheldon Clark, that it may entertain a request to permit the fight in Chicago. It is a member of the National Boxing association which has refused to uphold the New York commission's action in barring Graziano.  
After talking with Cohen, Pian said he planned to file a request with the IAC for permission to have the rematch in Chicago.  
Rumors that Zale would risk his crown against Marcel Cerdan in Yankee stadium June 8 were debunked by Pian. "We're not interested in Cerdan at all at this time," Pian asserted.
