Incidentally in these same quarters, the whisperers are prophesying a recrudescence of the Stassen presidential campaign when the former Minnesota governor returns from having seen Stalin during his current trip to Moscow.

Concessions
EVEN this rebellious coalition with the democrats, however, had to make some concessions to extricate the appointment from its three months senate conflict. Some of the republican votes gained for Lillenthal were drawn into support by being told their approving votes would be a rather technical endorsement...

The actual alternative offered these wavering votes was whether to let the present list slide into "the most important appointments a president ever made" (quotes are from a New York Herald Tribune story), with the chance that congress could keep the board from doing too much, or to open consideration of a new panel to start work afresh.

It is no injustice to anyone to report that practically no senator liked the idea of voting for Lillenthal and the board. Senate reporters commonly say this among themselves and believe it to be true. Possibly this common assertion may be exaggerated as far as the democrats are concerned, because Truman lost only 4 votes from his party on the final roll.

The board which is supposed to plan the next era of mankind therefore enters upon its duties officially under a somewhat doubtful cloud. But scientists rarely understand politics. Lillenthal was charged by Senator McKellar with being soft on communism. This may have been a defective allegation (although it was proved) because it could be excused by the knowledge that many new deal officials were similarly soft.

In fact bureau officials let so many communist sympathizers get in the government, Mr. Truman cannot now get rid of them. It is true also Lillenthal may have been called in the debate some things he was not.

But this may prove to be of less importance than the fact that he was NOT called what he is. He is one of the original Frankfurter boys from Harvard law school, one of the original new deal brain trusters and therefore an unusual appointee for a White House occupant like Mr. Truman, as well as an unusual one for republicans to support.

May Be Trouble

Here's a tip to start the week: Keep an eye on Korean developments.

Secretary of State Marshall's move in calling on Russia to cooperate with America in restoring the promised independence of Korea may at long last provide us with a test case to disclose the extent of the Soviet Union's ambitions for political expansion and domination of strategic foreign bases.

Korea isn't a big country (its area is about 85,000 square miles and its population some 25,000,000) but it is a mighty atom in the realignment of ones of influence among the world powers. It is, as this column has pointed out more than once, among the key military positions of the Far East, and its fate hinges largely on its military value.

Korea was promised its independence by the Cairo declaration of 1943, but the unhappy country is still divided in halves, with its northern portion occupied by Soviet troops and the southern section by the U. S. forces. America has been pressing for the establishment of a free government, but Undersecretary of State Dean Acheson, testifying before the senate foreign affairs committee in Washington in March, charged the Russians with blocking agreement for a unified Korea and said the United States would have to spend large sums for Korean aid.

Secretary Marshall now has warned Moscow that the United States intends to go ahead with independence measures in its own one to fulfill its obligations under the Moscow agreement of December, 1945, providing for the establishment of a joint American-Russian commission to work out plans for instituting a provisional Korean government as the first step toward the country's independence.

Meantime, of course, Korea is going to the dogs economically and politically. The northern half of the country occupied by the Russians is mainly industrial, while the American zone is agricultural. The economies of the two sections are vital complements to each other, but the Russians have dropped an iron curtain across the border between the two.
