

# Mine Safety Shutdown Ends Today

PITTSBURGH, April 14 (AP)—Spearheaded by re-opening of big captive coal mines in the Pittsburgh-Uniontown area, the safety shutdown of the United Mine Workers came to a formal end today. The return to work of thousands of miners shot bituminous production up towards normal.

The solid fuels administration reported output was "pretty much normal" in Pennsylvania. The mines of West Virginia, leading coal state with more than 100,000 miners, neared capacity production.

Seventy-five per cent of Eastern Ohio's 900,000 miners were back at work. Employees of one of the two major mines still idle scheduled a work resumption vote for this afternoon.

Some workers entering the Vesta No. 4 mine of Jones & Laughlin, at Richwood, Pa., declared they would be ready to stage a long walkout if no contract is reached with the operators by June 30, when government control of the pits ends.

Resumption of large scale mining finds fuel consuming industries generally in good shape, thanks to adequate reserves. The work stoppage began April 1 with a six-day mourning period for Centralia, Ill., mine blast victims, and then continued until Saturday under Lewis' edict that miners would stay at home pending federal inspection of all mines.

Still idle were some 123 pits out of 518 which Interior Secretary Krug ordered closed until specific safety measures were taken.

# Canada Urged To Join Union

WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) of the senate foreign relations committee urged today that Canada join the Pan-American union to complete "total new world unity."

Vandenberg told representatives of the 21 American republics he hopes this tightening of "continental fellowship" can be accomplished soon.

"The 22nd chair has been empty long enough," the Michigan senator said in an address prepared for ceremonies commemorating the 57th anniversary of the founding of the union.

"By every rule of righteousness she (Canada) is eligible to this association," Vandenberg said. "By every rule of reason we should wish her here. We would welcome the final and total new world unity which will be nobly dramatized when the 22nd chair is filled and our continental brotherhood is complete from the Arctic circle to Cape Horn."

Although in two earlier foreign policy speeches Vandenberg said he did not approve of state department politics toward Latin America, the foreign relations chairman made no similar reference today.

Due to the number of inquiries received by the vocational education department of Klamath Union high school, regarding a certified public accounting course for those desiring to take the state examinations for a CPA license in November, the department is attempting to learn how many persons would be interested in the course, with the view of starting one if sufficient interest is evident.

In order to complete the course before November it would be necessary to start the class no later than May 19, it was pointed out. The class would meet twice a week under the direction of Robert A. Mitchell. Fees for the class would be between \$50 and \$75, depending on the number of students enrolled.

To qualify for a CPA license it is necessary to have at least three years experience as a qualified bookkeeper.
