

Recreation Plans Aired At Council

Signs of growing activity were apparent at city council last night, brought on both by the good weather and approaching summer, and the impetus of a new administration.

The plan of the Kiwanis club for the taking over of the vacant, city-owned block at Division and Applegate for development as a children's park and playground was presented to the council by Councilman A. F. Condrey. The proposed park, to be known as Kiwanis Recreation park, would be a five or more year project for the organization, which plans to spend an average of \$2000 per year for the development. Councilman Condrey moved that the recreation committee's recommendation accepting the club's proposal be approved by the council. It was.

A memo from the recreation committee asked that property at Radcliffe and Washburn way, used for a trailer camp, now be available as a softball field. The council decided that it did not wish to fully relinquish the lots to the recreation committee, but instead permitted use of the lots without waiving title to them.

Adult Problem

Councilman Condrey also broached the question of who the parks and playgrounds were for, grown-ups or kids? He cited instances where children have been playing on the fields, only to be run off when an adult team of some sort wished its use. He stated his belief that the principal duty of the recreation department was to see that children had a place to play. Recreation Director Sam Smith said that the solution to the problem lay in granting adult teams permits for the use of the playing fields on certain dates and times, so that they would not interfere with the children's activities.

A small amount of discussion was devoted to a proposed special election for the levying of an additional 1 1/2 mill assessment for recreation purposes. The matter was referred to the judiciary committee for further study.

The recreation committee will hold a meeting Friday evening in the council chambers, it was announced.

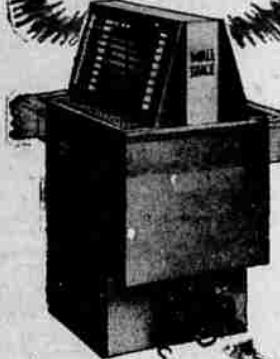
Council Okays 17 Permits

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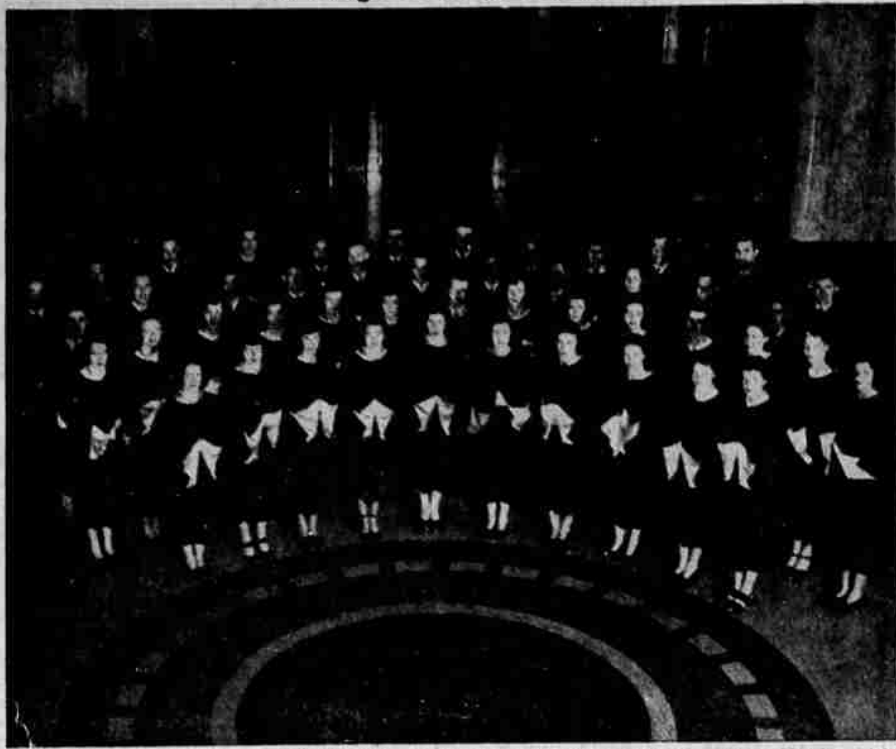
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Choir Sings at First Methodist

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Suit Filed In Move To Get Buildings Off Site

A suit filed with the county clerk yesterday is the latest step in the two-year long battle of the city to get the proposed site of the Veterans Memorial Park vacated of the two old buildings still standing.

The suit names Lora E. Evans, C. E. Bismark and James Sullivan as co-defendants. City Attorney Henry Perkins reviewed the situation to the council, stating that in October, 1945, the city had purchased the property from Syd B. Evans with the proviso that the buildings on the lots be torn down within six months from the purchase date. Evans, Perkins said, then sold one of the buildings to Bismark and another to Sullivan with the same proviso, that they be removed within six months. So far, he added, neither of the two structures has been moved. Perkins stated that Mrs. Evans was named in the suit as the heir to Syd Evans, with whom the city holds the contract.

Bismark was in the council chamber audience and arose to protest the suit, but to no avail.

The city fathers, however, had further business with him. Bismark purportedly purchased the building with the intention of tearing it down and making a houseboat from the lumber. The building inspector, in looking over the houseboat plans, nixed the idea, and refused to issue Bismark a building permit. That Bismark claims, is the reason he hasn't removed the building from the lots. If the city would give him a permit he would move the building.

Inquiry by the council, however, revealed that the lack of a building permit had not stopped Bismark from starting construction on his houseboat, which is now partially completed at the foot of Klamath. A complaint was signed yesterday charging Bismark with building without the city's permission. The council also instructed the building inspector to see that the partially constructed houseboat is torn down and removed by Bismark, or to do so himself. Bismark left the council chambers remarking:

"This is the thanks I'm getting, after being a Klamath Falls citizen for 32 years."
