DORRIS, Calif., April 15—Two men accused of procuring intoxicants for three Indian women drew heavy fines in justice court here when they appeared before Justice of the Peace Hubert Oliver of Mac-

doel and after pleading guilty were fined \$200 each.

The men were Otto Holtzhauser of Dorris and Kenneth Roberts of Sweet Home, Ore., and two of the Indian women in the party were from the Klamath reservation in Oregon.

The arrests and convictions followed nearly an entire week of investigation here by practically the entire personnel of the third district board of equalization, headed by Dewey Eagan of Redding and aided by Van G. Klock of Redding, special investigators. Other agents here were Tom C. O'Connor of Mt. Shasta and Gene Hickey of Redding.
