

Property Owners Protest Crumbling Bluff Between Lookout, Oregon Streets

A petition from four of the property owners near the Rose street corners of Lookout and Oregon was read to the city council last night asking that something be done about the bluff midway between the two streets in back of the Shell service station, the barbecue drive-in and Emil's food store. The bluff is slowly receding and crumbling into the alley. The petition claimed that the bluff is a hazard to youngsters and resulted in property devaluations close to it. One man, representing the property owners, stated that the bluff had crumbled off 15 feet in the last five years. It was found that the property belonged to Councilman W. D. Miller and it was moved that the matter be referred to the city engineer. Councilman Miller was not present at the meeting.

A group from the First Christian church appeared at the meeting, led by Rev. H. P. Hutchins, their pastor, to object to the proposed erection of a large poster panel on the lots to the rear of their church building. Specifically they claimed that the panel would be only three feet from their building and would block off the light from some of their windows and would also create a nuisance in the neighborhood. Rev. Hutchins stated that the panel would become "an outdoor toilet," and also pointed out that the possibility of liquor being advertised at the rear of the church was not desirable. As yet, it was found, no building permit has been issued for the erection of the panel, and the council ordered the building inspector to check the situation before issuing one.

House Protested
A lady arose in the audience to point out the undesirable and unsanitary condition present in a house at 303 Iowa. She explained that a fire had occurred there just yesterday morning and when the firemen entered the place they found "the rottenest, dirtiest mess you ever saw." Fire Chief Keith Ambrose verified her statements and even said that she had made an understatement. The council referred the matter to the sanitary inspector and the fire chief with the power to act.

Bids for the bonds on improvement unit 93 were read to the council from the U. S. National bank and the First National bank, and turned over to the finance committee for study.

Stetson Hats
A letter was also read from the Klamath Kennel club regarding the establishment of a pet cemetery somewhere in the city. The recommendation of the club was accepted and the mayor was asked to appoint a committee to study the matter.

Curfew Change Asked
Police Chief Orville Hamilton recommended to the council that the curfew ordinance be rewritten to include all youngsters to the age of 18 years and younger. He explained that the ordinance only provides for children up to the age of 17 at present, leaving a period of one year of age wherein the youths are not bound by any laws. "They don't have to answer the curfew, and yet they are out of our jurisdiction because they are juveniles," the chief said.

The unsightly and hazardous condition in various parts of the city due to large amounts of mud on the paving was brought out by Councilman F. Conroy, who mentioned especially the condition on Market street where the Klamath Concrete Pipe company is located. Conroy said that the mud was formed by the washing of the company's trucks, and the absence of adequate drainage facilities. It was recommended that the matter be turned over to the city engineer for his action in either getting the property owners to keep the paving clean or else close the street.

Also in connection with the washing of vehicles, service station operators were warned that washing cars where the water would run over the sidewalk and create a nuisance, was a violation of the city ordinance and punishable. It was stated that all vehicles must be washed where there were adequate drainage facilities.

Circus Sited
A letter was received from the Clyde Beauty circus asking that the date on its license be changed to May 10, due to a slow-down while in Southern California. The request was granted.

The mayor told the council that the city would formally take control of the naval air station April 26, and announced that there would be a meeting Wednesday of the airport committee to discuss the acquisition.
