

Trout Fishing Opens Saturday, April 26

Season Will Run Until October 15; Most Lakes In Klamath And Adjoining Counties Closed For At Least Another Month

Saturday, April 26, is the opening date for general trout season in Oregon, and the season will run until October 15, but the exceptions to the rule marked down for Klamath and adjoining counties will keep the local angling vista considerably narrowed for at least another month.

Over in the tidewater area of the Rogue, Umpqua and Smith rivers trout season doesn't open until June 15.

The general bag limit is 10 fish (6 inches long or better), but not to exceed 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, and 30 fish but not in excess of 30 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days.

In Klamath county April 26 will mark the opening of the north portion of Upper Klamath lake and Agency lake, Lake o' the Woods, Seven Mile creek, Williamson, Sprague and the other streams, while Davis lake's season runs from June 28 to September 1, and all other lakes in the county will be open from May 24 to September 21.

Season at Lake o' the Woods closes November 30, and the bag limit at that resort is 10 pounds and one fish in one day, and not over two days' aggregate in seven days.

At Douglas county's Diamond lake the season runs from June 7 to September 14, with the proviso that the water around the mouth of Short and Silent creeks not be fished until July 15. Five fish of at least 10 inches in length in a day, or 20 fish in seven days is the limit at Diamond lake.

In Jackson county, Fish and Squaw lakes are open from April 26 to September 30. In Deschutes county all lakes are open from May 24 until September 21, except as arranged otherwise by the game commission. The North Twin season is from May 24 to July 20, and South Twin from June 28 to August 24.

The stretch of the Deschutes river from Wickiup dam to Sheep bridge is open for trout fishing from May 24 to October 15, and the river from Little Lava lake downstream from May 21 to September 21. A bag limit of five fish has been decreed for most lakes in Deschutes county.

Jackie Robinson, Brooklyn's negro first baseman, and first of his race to reach the majors since 1884, failed to get a hit in three official trips to the plate, but his sacrifice-error play in the seventh inning set up the subsequent tying and winning runs.

Earl Torgeson, Boston Braves' rookie first baseman from Snohomish, failed to hit in four trips. It was Torgeson's throw to first of Robinson's bunt that hit the negro star on the leg and set up Brooklyn's winning tally.

In all, 244,698 fans witnessed the eight curtain-raisers, only 2000 less than last year's record turnout.

After setting down the first 15 batters to face him, Tex Hughson, Boston's 20-game winner last season, faltered in the eighth, as the Senators scored four times to

win 4-3.

Eddie Miller, the sore-armed shortstop, who thought seriously of quitting the game this spring, and long-armed Ewell Blackwell, last year's National league shut-out king, conspired to upset the world champion St. Louis Cardinals in Cincinnati's 47th straight home opener. The Reds won 3-1.

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Sea Lion Herd Faces Paring

PORTLAND, April 16 (AP)—Decision on an open season on Oregon's sea lion herd may be made at the May 13 meeting of the state fish commission.

The commission reported a probable area for the legalized killing would be south of the Siuslaw river to the California border. An open season was decreed two years ago at the mouth of the Rogue river.

Southwestern Oregon sportsmen's groups have asked the commission to curtail the herds, one of the state's coast tourist attractions, because the animals have become so numerous that their feeding is threatening the existence of salmon runs in the coastal rivers.

Hoag Signs For Monte

Duane (Buzsaw) Hoag, the fiery and popular little man from Portland, has been signed for a return engagement in the Klamath Falls ring. Matchmaker Mack Lillard announced this morning.

Hoag, backed by telegraph late yesterday to step into the ring with Monte Montgomery in next Tuesday night's 10-round lightweight main event. The amount of money promised Hoag for this re-appearance was not disclosed.

Montgomery has already been signed for the match and has been working out almost continuously since he was beaten by Hoag over a week ago. That fight went just two rounds, with both boys scoring knockdowns along the way.

The finish was scored as a knock-out for Hoag, although it was a deal in which the referee was late in picking up the count from the timekeeper. Plenty of good fight fans were enraged over the count.

Also lined up is one of the supporting bouts for Tuesday's card, a middleweight tiff between Bruce Miller and Bob Eastman. This fight will be a sort of acid test for Eastman, who has been bowling over all comers, in that Miller is a rough, tough boy and can punch.

That will be a five round fight, one of two of that length on the card.

A 6 to 1 win over the Medford Black Tornado yesterday afternoon put the Klamath Pelicans on top of the high school baseball heap in Southern Oregon. The Pelis now have beaten Grants Pass and Medford.

Golden Eggs Kicked Out

SPOKANE, Wash., April 16 (AP)—The Spokane Athletic Round Table, sponsor of some of the northwest's biggest sports events, today will close down its slot machines—the mechanical geese that laid those golden eggs.

Attorney Joseph A. Albi, Round Table president, said the club would comply with a city ban against the machines, though their loss, he has predicted, would force the Table to give up future major athletic events.

The Round Table and seven other private clubs sought to restrain enforcement of the ordinances on the grounds that they were superseded by a state law licensing the slots. However, the court included in its ruling an issue now pending before the state supreme court, declaring the state law violated an anti-lottery provision of the state constitution.

FRISCO TAKES LEAD

Pacific Coast league baseball made its 1947 debut Northwest yesterday as 11,000 fans watched the Seattle Rainiers squeeze out a 3-2 extra-inning victory over the Los Angeles Angels. Portland and San Francisco bow the season into the Rose City today.

A wild throw into the Angel dug-out by Second Baseman Lou Stringer gave Seattle the deciding run in the 11th inning. Bob Johnson booming in with the tally.

Dick Barrett, making his first start in a Rainier uniform since 1944 lost control in the ninth when Los Angeles came from behind to tie the count at 2-all. Sigmund Yakuoki succeeded him and, after an initial wildness, settled down to take the win.

Elsewhere in the league, San Francisco took over the top spot in the pennant race without swinging a bat as San Diego's Padres dropped an 11-inning thriller to Hollywood by a 3-2 count.

Hollywood's southpaw hurler, Albert Yaylian, 23, sewed things up for the Stars' opening home game when he hit a double in the second extra inning and then barely beat the peg to the plate when Outfielder Jim Delsing singled. Yaylian took over the pitching job from tiring Krakauskas in the 10th inning and retired six batters in order, three by strikeouts. It was

the sixth overtime game of the season for the stubborn Padres.

Three-hit pitching by Guy Fletcher gave the Sacramento Solons a 4 to 1 victory over Oakland and spoiled the Oaks' opening home appearance. Fletcher held Oakland hitless until the sixth inning and it was his fourth victory of the season against no losses.
