

Tuberculosis Control Subject Of Address At Public Health Meeting

Values of educational work in a public program of tuberculosis control, were brought out in an address by Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the Oregon Tuberculosis hospital in Salem, at the annual dinner meeting of the Klamath County Public Health association Tuesday night at the Willard.

Dr. Bellinger emphasized the importance of testing high school seniors each year, to prevent disappointment when they take the physical examinations on entering colleges in the fall.

Besides the active campaign against tuberculosis, the Public Health association is constantly working toward a cleaner, higher standard of living. Dr. Bellinger told the nearly 50 persons present at the meeting, with educational programs on social hygiene and venereal disease.

"Smoldering tuberculosis," is a tubercular condition which may be active but is not apparent in some of the most healthy-looking people, according to Dr. Bellinger. This is the most dangerous kind as it gains too strong a foothold before it is discovered. Only regular tests can search out this "smoldering" condition. The X-ray program can do this, the doctor explained, but before the mobile unit makes its

annual visit, it is necessary for a thorough survey to be made together with an intensive educational program.

This control of disease which formerly wiped out whole families, is possible through funds received from Christmas seal sales, the speaker said, and it should be borne in mind when purchasing seals that the greater number bought, the sooner and the higher our living standards will be raised.

L. Orth Sisemore, chairman, introduced the speaker following the dinner, invocation by Rev. Godfrey Matthews and welcome speech by Lawrence E. Slater, retiring president.

Election of officers followed with William McKibbin named as the new president. Mrs. E. A. Fishing Rights Suit Filed

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16 (AP)—The federal court here is asked in an injunction suit filed by U. S. District Attorney Henry L. Hess to defend the fishing rights of numerous Indian tribes along the Columbia.

The complaint accuses Ernest F. and E. R. Cramer of violating treaty rights of Pacific Northwest tribes by erecting scaffolding and other obstructions on standing Rock island at Celilo Falls.

Chief Tommy Thompson of the Columbia river tribes was named as one of seven Indians whose fishing rights have individually been interfered with by the scaffolding erected by the Cramers since 1934.

Machine Shed Burns Down

MERRILL, April 16—The fire department answered a call Monday at 2:45 p. m. and rushed to the Cliff Shuck ranch one mile north of Merrill where a machine shed was burning.

The fire destroyed approximately 100 gallons of diesel oil and several pieces of farm equipment and spare parts.

The machine shed was dangerously close to the new farm house and barn, and quick response of the city and rural fire trucks was credited in saving these buildings. Damage was estimated at between \$5000 and \$7000.

An employee burning weeds nearby lost control of the blaze which caught the machine shed.

During the excitement a pet elk ran into a fence and was killed trying to get away from the flaming building.
