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Dr. L. Epley Dies At 75

Dr. Lloyd L. Epley, 75, minister and educator in Oregon and California since 1914, and father of Malcolm Epley and Mrs. Helen Hoffman of Klamath Falls, died Tuesday in Puente, Calif.

Death followed a lingering illness. Dr. and Mrs. Epley had visited in Klamath Falls with their son and daughter earlier in the year, but had returned to Puente in February because of his falling health.

Born in Freeport, Ill., Dr. Epley spent his boyhood on a farm in Nebraska. He graduated from York college in Nebraska, and received a master's degree after work at the University of Nebraska.

Dr. Epley served as a circuit

rider in Nebraska in the 1890's, traveling constantly on horseback to visit his charges. He served as a minister and conference superintendent in the United Brethren church in Nebraska, and taught in York college. After a short period as acting president of that college, he came to Oregon in 1914 as president of Philomath college at Philomath, a denominational school now closed. He served on the Oregon committee on higher education curricula.

Going to California in 1922, he served several pastorates in his church, including churches at Riverside and San Diego. Several years ago he retired, and has since been living at Puente.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Mina Hall Epley, a teacher and writer, the son and daughter here, six grandchildren including Mrs. Edward Simpson, formerly of Klamath Falls, now living at Hosking near Corvallis; Malvern D. and William L. Alcorn, Malcolm
