

Hot Weather Speeds Up Farm Work

Temperatures which hit consistently in the 80's the past week, has speeded up farm activities throughout the entire Klamath basin, according to County Agent C. A. Henderson, and general plowing of the fertile acres is about the earliest on record.

Considerable leveling undertaken last fall and not completed has been finished this spring. Henderson observed, and soil in general has dried out to the extent that all kinds of dirt moving activities are considerably advanced.

Not General

Planting is not general as yet although rye, wheat and peas have been planted in all parts of the county. Flax and barley planting will get under way the latter part of the month and oat planting is under way at the present time. Also, planting of onions and sugar beets in the south end is way ahead of normal and conditions have been particularly favorable for planting. Fine weather of the last few days has caused gardeners to get active and much early gardening is going on. Such hardy vegetables as peas, radishes, carrots, turnips, etc., have been and are being planted but the more tender varieties such as tomatoes, corn, cucumbers, beans, etc., should not be planted for another 15 or 30 days. General blooming of early fruit trees is underway and might either mean a good crop or none at all, depending entirely upon weather conditions for the next few days. At the present time prospects are good for these early bloomers but rather low temperatures do occur early at this altitude.

Much Activity

While the Klamath basin potato acreage seems to be considerably decreased from last year there is much activity at the present time in the preparation of land and seed. A little extremely early planting has been started. General planting will not get under way until about May 1. Growers seem to be unusually careful in the selection of seed stock as they realize that the kind of seed planted will have a direct bearing on the income received this fall. Interest in the treating of seed seems to be somewhat above normal with numerous requests for treating methods from the county agent's office.

Labor Bills Said Unconstitutional

PORTLAND, April 17 (AP)—Two labor bills passed by the Oregon legislature have been called unconstitutional by the national legal advisor of the state federation of labor.

The state federation reported the bill involving secondary boycotts and requiring an election to determine whether there is a labor dispute may be attacked in the courts. Similar bills are now under attack in California courts.

Hospital Survey Given Approval

PORTLAND, April 17 (AP)—A survey of Oregon hospitals and plans for new hospital facilities and construction have been authorized by the advisory council of the Oregon board of health.

The council reported the program was approved to enable the state to share in 50 per cent federal participation in the survey and up to 30 per cent of the cost of new hospitals.

Yugos Demand Austrian Land

MOSCOW, April 17 (AP)—The council of foreign ministers heard a demand today that a large slice of Austrian Carinthia be turned over to Yugoslavia in any peace settlement.

The four-power council's first morning session of this conference was addressed by Yugoslav Vice Premier Edvard Kardelj, who repeated his nation's previous charges that a third of the German army which fought in Yugoslavia was Austrian; that there were 80 Austrian generals in the German army, and that an Austrian general commanded the air forces which bombed Belgrade at the war's start.

Austrian Foreign Minister Karl Gruber has insisted that his government never would sign a treaty ceding southern Carinthia. The Yugoslavs are supported by Russia.

Kardelj, in a long speech, presented figures he said showed that for 100 years Slavs have outnumbered Austrians in Slovene Carinthia.

Holy Land Plan Eyed

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., April 17 (AP)—A British spokesman said today his country would propose exclusion of all five major powers from the proposed committee of inquiry on Palestine which will be considered by the special session of the United Nations assembly beginning April 28.

Britain also was reported opposed to granting committee representation to either Jews or Arabs. The committee's task will be to sift all available information on the Palestine problem and make recommendations to the regular assembly session meeting in September.

Under the British plan, the spokesman said, the committee would comprise about a dozen small powers who have little or no direct interest in the highly controversial question, so that it could avoid the pressure which might result if interested parties were represented.
