Explosives To Go On National Market

PORTLAND, April 18 (AP)—The Portland war assets administration office today moved into the national market seeking buyers for four million pounds of surplus high explosives stored at the Umatilla ordnance depot.

Half the Umatilla supply is TNT in solid blocks and the rest single and fused chains of tetrytol, intended for underwater demolition. The WAA said the northwest holds few prospective customers for such a large supply—which cost the government approximately \$4,000,000—and it would be advertised nationally.

City Park Project Gets Approval Of Kiwanis Club

A city-block square children's playground was approved Thursday by members of the Klamath Falls Kiwanis club which made final announcement of a five-year project to give children of the city a place to play.

The block is located in Mills addition and bounded by Applegate, Reclamation, Division and Mitchell streets. The project was first voiced by the youth service committee of the club a month and a half ago and contact was made at that time with the city recreation committee and the city council involving city-owned property.

Location of the playground was decided upon when the block, which is city-owned, appeared to be the most satisfactory place to locate a children's playground. The city continues to own the property and will own all improvements made on the land.

The council, in session Monday night, accepted the recommendation of the recreation committee and Kiwanians, giving the green light on the project. An architect's drawing was shown to members of the club at the regular luncheon today, showing the completed five-year project which embraces a softball diamond, a wading pool, playshed and rest rooms, swings, and other playground equipment. The drawing was presented to the club by Architect Sheldon Brumbaugh.

The committee has authority to start work immediately and intends to complete turfing the entire block, putting in a sprinkler system and setting up the softball diamond which will be ready for use of the children by the latter part of June, this year. That will complete the 1947 program, Kiwanis club members said, but next year the work will further advance as far as possible, continuing throughout the five-year period.

The Kiwanis club, which unanimously approved the project yesterday, will underwrite the entire cost of operation immediately. Many persons outside the club have made offers to help and those interested today said that all donations would be accepted.

Survey Of Precincts

A survey of all voting precincts in the city is being started by the Council of Oregon Republican Women, unit No. 2, to check unregistered voters and urge them to get their names on the poll books so as to be prepared in advance for regular and special elections.

At the last meeting of the group each member was presented with a map of the city with precincts marked, along with full instructions on precinct work. This work is to be conducted on a non-partisan basis, democrats and republicans alike being urged to register.

Seven new directors are to be chosen each for a two-year term. Members of the chamber are voting on nominees from the entire membership list. Fourteen will be nominated and the seven directors chosen in runoff.

Runoff ballots will probably be mailed out to all chamber members next Wednesday, and the election closes April 29.
