"Making a Correct Speech" was the topic chosen by Mrs. Leon Kitchin, toastmistress of the evening, at the regular meeting of the Klamath Falls Toastmistress club held at the home of Mrs. Kitchin on April 9.

"Three things should be considered in choosing a speech," said Mrs. Helen Mueller. "The subject should suit the occasion, be of interest to the audience and familiar to the speaker, but if the subject of the speech is not familiar, a great deal of research must be done in order to give the audience a well rounded view of the subject."

"After the subject matter of the speech is chosen which usually falls into one of these categories, to entertain, to explain, to impress or to convince, a good outline is most important to the success of a good speech," said Mrs. Emmett Chidester.

"Quiet confidence in the fact that the clothes you are wearing, are becoming and will not detract audience attention from your speech is an aid in conquering stage fright," said Mrs. Rufus Quillen, "as too often the audience's attention wanders to the too ornate hat instead of concentrating on the speech and far too often it is the hat rather than the speech that is remembered and discussed."

"Quantities of research should be done on each subject that is assigned to the individual speaker," said Mrs. Paul Duck, "because it is otherwise unfair to the audience to give a one-sided version of the topic and take up their time without adequate preparation and organization of the speech."

"Good English, correct pronunciation, good posture and an adequately prepared speech," said Dorothea Beckwith, "are essential in giving confidence to the speaker and the three points of a good speech are 'Stand up, Speak up, Shut up.'"
