**Lobby Proposal Being Considered**  
SALT LAKE CITY, April 19 (AP)—A plan advanced by E. M. Weston of Seattle, president of the Washington State Federation of Labor, for western labor interests to establish a lobby in Washington, D. C., has been taken under advisement by delegates from 11 states attending a conference of State Federation of Labor (AFL) leaders.

J. D. McDonald, president of the Oregon state federation, told the conference the Oregon Automobile Dealers' association fostered anti-labor bills in the recent legislative session that were "poorly and loosely drawn" and "probably unconstitutional."

He was among delegates reporting on anti-labor measures passed in western states this winter.

**Sugar Beet Figure Shows Huge Gain**  
TULELAKE, April 19 (AP)—Approximately 2500 acres of sugar beets have been contracted by the Spreckles Sugar company in this area in comparison to 780 acres last year, according to C. W. Fensler, local representative.

Much of the seeding has already been completed and the acreages are distributed about evenly between former operators and the new home-steaders.

**New Parole Law Gives Latitude**  
PORTLAND, April 19 (AP)—More equitable treatment of Oregon prisoners will be possible through new parole law amendments, Gerald Mason, chairman of Oregon's parole board, said today.

"There have been cases where judges have seen fit to give out sentences for crimes of similar nature in which the penalty varied from three years in one case to 25 years in another," Mason said. "Under the new law we can adjust the longer sentence, if it is compatible with justice."

**Traction Workers OK Compromise**  
PORTLAND, April 19 (AP)—Portland Traction company employees voted last night to accept a company wage increase offer of 11 cents an hour with promise of four cents more if a fare increase is approved by the city council.

The AFL unions involved originally asked a 25 cent an hour boost. The company has asked a fare boost from the present 8 1/3 cents to 10 cents.

A union spokesman said the increase put the top scale to \$1.36 an hour.
