## Champs In Last Place; Cincy Redlegs Coming Up With National League Surprise

Eddie Miller, who only a few weeks ago was put on display in a showcase window for disposal to the highest bidder without attracting any takers, definitely established himself today as the key to Cincinnati's chances for a first division berth.

The blue-fingered shortstop, currently pacing the major league hitters with four home runs in seven games, bit two home runs yesterday to help the Reds gain an even break in their doubleheader with the Pirates at Pittsburgh. Auggie Galan and Bobby Adams joined Miller in the home run parade to lead the Reds to a 13-5 victory over the Pirates in the opener. Three of Pittsburgh's runs resulted from Hank Greenberg's second home run of the campaign.

# Monte Has Big Hopes

Working out steadily for his second try in the big time is popular Monte Montgomery, Indian lightweight, who will fight Duane Hoag in the 10-round main event here on tomorrow night's armory fistic card. He figures on winning.

Once before, two weeks ago, Monte stepped into the ring with Hoag—only to be knocked out by one of the best in his weight in the Northwest—and was counted out on a knockdown in the second round.

In that fight, short as it was, both Hoag and Montgomery were on the canvas repeatedly and Montgomery's loss has been eyed by many local ring fans as a fluke, hence the clamor for a return.

Ralph Weiser, another pretty good lightweight locally, is matched in one of the two five-rounders on tomorrow's card. Ralph will fight Max Jasper of Portland, who after a longslide Hoag, Weiser, a former AAU titlist, has won three fights by kayos here, been knocked out by Montgomery, lost one decision and gone one standard.

The other five-round session will pit Bob Eastman against Bruce Miller, in what will be a tough test for the hard-punching youngster. Eastman, who has had four wins and a draw in five middleweight fights here, in addition to winning a state AAU belt.

Miller has been active in the ring ever since boxing was started up in Klamath Falls after the wartime layoff a year ago, and has seven wins and a draw to his credit.

Two four-rounders will round out the card. In the opener George Price, Merrill, and Cal Hutchinson will tangle in the lightweight bracket, and in the second bout of the evening Darrell Harrington is slated for a tiff with Rod Bortis of Ashland, welterweight.

# Pacific Coast League ... Tommy Bridges Hurls No-Hitter For Bevos

Tommy Bridges, the former great Detroit curveball artist now operating for the Portland Beavers, is the first no-run, no-hit game pitcher of 1947.

Achieving the first no-hitter of his 19-year career, the slender Tennesseean, now 40, came within one batter of a perfect game yesterday as he set down the San Francisco Seals, 2-0, in the first half of a Pacific Coast league doubleheader.

The only Seal to reach base was Bones Sanders, who walked in the eighth but was quickly erased on a double play.

Bridges fanned five in hanging up his second win against no defeat. It was his third start as the Beavers' Sunday pitcher. He has tied one. In his other win, incidentally, the ex-Tiger allowed only two hits.

Only four Bridges' pitches were hit out of the infield yesterday. In his long American league career, Bridges pitched three one-hit games, once in 1932, going through 8 and 2/3 innings before giving up a safety.

The veterans sterling performance gave the Beavers their sixth straight win over San Francisco and assured the Oregonians of a hold on first place, which they share with San Diego, as the PCL went into its fourth week.

The Seals bounced back to take the final game, 11-4, on some hefty hitting and the effective pitching of rookie Bob Chesnes.

San Diego pulled abreast of Portland by nabbing a pair from Hollywood, 7-5 and 2-1, after dropping Saturday's game. Homers by Max West and Pete Coscarart clinched the first contest, while Manny Salvo's five-hit twirling assured the affiliate. Todd Davis' circuit drive accounted for the only run off Salvo.

Los Angeles moved into third place ahead of Sacramento as the Angels swept three week-end games from Seattle while the Solons took three whippings from Oakland.
