

Insurance, Purchase Of City Lots, Report On Airport Occupy Council

The city council last night voted to demand full insurance payment for \$358 in damages sustained by a city fire truck in a collision with a dump truck at Main and Broad streets last November, but not until after the situation had touched off a wordy tiff between Councilmen Paul Landry and A. F. Condrey.

Starting the argument, a letter was read from the Fire Companies Adjustment Bureau suggesting the city accept an offer from an unnamed company of \$264 in settlement for the asserted \$358 damages.

Councilman Landry leveled a blast at what he termed "chiseling outsiders" and told the council it ought to demand full payment if the bill is a fair one. He said the city should be wary of setting a precedent of accepting less than the amount of damages from insurance firms.

Councilman Condrey dissented from Landry's viewpoint, stating that if the matter went to court it would cost the city just as much as the loss incurred in accepting the offer. He added, "I'm against spending the taxpayers' money in this manner."

The council asked the city attorney to demand payment of the entire amount from the insurance company, and if it did not accede, to start proceedings against it.

Power Station Purchase

A bid by the California Oregon Power company for the purchase of two city-owned lots in Industrial addition on which to erect a power sub-station, brought up the question, "Who will pay for moving Copco poles if it was found necessary to move them for street improvements later?"

It was explained that under the franchise agreement the city must pay when the poles are moved for city business from city property. Councilman Condrey stated that he was not entirely satisfied, and that as it was a "point of question," he favored tacking a restrictive clause to the deed.

It was pointed out, however, that the question was brought up a little late as the permission for the erecting of the building had already been given the company by a "dozen or so" city officials and committees, the point at hand being merely for the purchase of the property from the city. The mayor ended the discussion by stating, "It's already passed, so let's go ahead."

The name "Oregon Polytechnic Institute" was used for the new technical school at the Marine Barracks by the city planning commission. The name was mentioned in a recommendation from the commission that the city clean up the area surrounding the city dump in order that it might present a better view from the road to the school, which has not yet been formally named.

Mrs. Ralph McNutt, heading a small group from the Pelican school PTA, expressed disappointment that her retinue was not larger, but told the council that the children in Pelican City and the Shippington addition had no place to play. She asked if the recreation department could not find some way of furnishing the children there a small playground. The council expressed sympathy with the group's purpose and asked Recreation Director Sam Smith to see what he could do about the matter.

Crumpling Bluff
Two of the group of property owners along Oregon and Upham who had appeared last week to ask the council's action on a crumpling bluff in their block, were told by Councilman Landry that Councilman W. D. Miller, owner of the property, was in sympathy with their problem but was necessarily unable to attend council meetings for several weeks due to business. He asked if the group could come back when Miller could be present. Objections were asked for on improvement unit number 86, the paving of S. 7th from Oak to Plum. No one objected.

The report of the airport manager was read to the council and Councilman Condrey objected that the report was not in good business order. He pointed to one expenditure.

Councilman Condrey asked the council to instruct the police department to use force, if necessary, to get the alleys of the city cleaned. The matter was turned over to the mayor for action.

Fire Chief Keith Ambrose asked the members of the fire committee to get together with him and Howard Perrin, architect, for perusal of the preliminary plans for the proposed new fire station in Mills addition.
