

## Fire Station Site Inspected

City officials are again considering the possibility of erecting a new fire station in Mills addition, and a committee today selected two corner lots at Mitchell and Shasta way as the best site for the project.

Mayor Ed Ostendorf said this morning that the committee believes that the corner of Radcliffe and Division, originally set aside a number of years ago by the city for a fire station, is inadequate because of its small size and location, which, they feel, is too far from the main business district in that area.

The proposed station would be in addition to the present one on Broad and Wall. Should the project be approved it will have to be presented to the voters in order to finance it either by a bond issue or special levy.

Investigating the locations were Keith K. Ambrose, fire chief; Paul O. Landry, councilman; Howard Perrin, architect, and the mayor.

## Mundlin Death Reported Here

Guy Dee Mundlin, 26, a resident of Klamath Falls for eight years, died in this city Monday evening following an illness of two months. He was a native of Sheridan, Wyo.

Among survivors is a brother, Sgt. Newton J. Mundlin, who is serving with the marine corps in China. The American Red Cross is making an effort to notify him. Others surviving are his wife, Mrs. Jean Mundlin, a son, Thomas Carl, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard W. Mundlin, and four other brothers, Richard Jr., Jay W., and Ralph L., all of Klamath Falls, and Robert S., of Brownwood, Tex.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later by the Earl Whitlock funeral home.

## Korean Meeting Asked By Soviets

MOSCOW, April 22 (AP)—Russia—responding to a suggestion by the United States—proposed Tuesday that the joint Soviet-American commission empowered to start Korea on the road to independence meet in Seoul on May 20 to resume its work, interrupted by basic disagreements 11 months ago.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, replying to a letter from Secretary of State George C. Marshall on the Korean question, blamed American members of the commission for causing the breakdown in negotiations last May.

He suggested a provisional government and free election.

## Soil Offices Now Vacant In Building

The moving of the U. S. soil conservation offices from the Stewart-Drew building this week to the federal building left three offices vacant.

These offices are being cleaned and refurnished and two will be occupied by a child dentist, Dr. John Negrevaki of Portland and Fred B. Southwell, accountant, who has occupied offices with W. W. Southwell in the same building for the past year.

Negotiations for the third office have not been completed, according to N. B. Drew, co-owner of the building.

## Potato Shipments Show Slight Drop

Basin potato shipments reached a total of 10,542 carloads for the 1946-47 season up to last night, according to U. S. department of agriculture figures. 18 carloads more than the amount shipped by the same date last season.

The basin will have to yield at least 177 more carloads this season in order to beat last year's total of 10,719 carloads shipped by June 3.

SHIP FREIGHT RATE UP ASKED WASHINGTON, April 22 (AP)—The maritime commission told the interstate commerce commission today that the nation's domestic ship service is threatened with a complete breakdown and asked for a quick upward revision in freight transportation rates.

The maritime commission is still operating the wartime-seized merchant fleet, but must turn the ships back to private operation by June 30.

Mazzier has moved his business out on East Main and has discontinued shoe repairing, concentrating on shoe building and re-building.

## Youth Flees From State Prison Farm

SALEM, April 22 (AP)—State police today were searching for Leo G. Williams, 20, state prison convict who escaped yesterday from the prison farm plant.

He was sentenced last June 4 from Union county to serve two years for burglary. Since he has served a third of his sentence, the state parole board was to have considered his parole this month. However, the escape will make him ineligible for parole.

## Friends "Fix Things Up" For War Wounded Marine

PORTLAND, April 22 (AP)—Friends of 20-year-old Jimmy Faubion, who lost both legs stopping a bullet in the first marine assault on Okinawa, believe they have "fixed things up" for the disabled veteran.

Jimmy came home less than a month ago from 21 months and many operations in naval hospitals. He found the upstairs bedroom and bath a difficult problem of living. Mrs. Faubion, widow of a World War I marine and also a nurse of that war, faced a \$2000 mortgage before an addition could be built to aid her son.

A neighbor started the rounds and a cash fund soon grew. An architect became interested. He talked to a contractor who sent word to supply firms. Within a week it was a cinch—Jimmy would have a new bedroom and bath on the ground floor. A benefit dance and other functions will help pay off the mortgage.

More than that, Jimmy's friends at the Civic theatre, where before the war he had bit roles, hauled him to rehearsals. They set a benefit performance date—and Jimmy will be carried onto the stage on a stretcher to play a role in the "Prince of Arragon."

Amid the excitement, Jimmy still keeps busy writing short stories and plays—which he hopes to turn into a life vocation in his postwar world.

## M. S. Barnes Dies At Home

Marion S. Barnes, 78, at one time Lake county game warden and for many years a Lakeview blacksmith in business with Eldon Woodcock, died at his home near Willows, Calif., at 1:20 p. m. Tuesday, according to word received by his brother, William B. Barnes, 321 S. 5th.

Mr. and Mrs. Marion J. Barnes and W. B. Barnes of this city, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Barnes of Lakeview, left today for Willows to attend final rites for the Oregon and California pioneer. Marion S. was the youngest brother of W. B. Barnes. It was the second death in the family in one year. Hiram Barnes, another brother, having died at his California home several months ago. Survivors include the widow, Katherine, two sons and one daughter, and the two brothers, Frank of Lakeview and W. B. of Klamath Falls. Final rites will be held at 2 p. m. Thursday at Willows.
