OPA To Die On June First

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—OPA, its death date set officially for June 1, estimated today that about 2750 employees will receive dismissal notices in the next week.

An executive order by President Truman fixed the windup date for OPA and its two companion agencies in the office of temporary controls—the civilian production administration and the office of war mobilization and reconversion.

Most of the functions of the three wartime agencies will be transferred to other government offices on May 4 under the presidential directive issued yesterday.

To help carry on the duties to be transferred, commerce will take

about 1200 employees from OPA; 550 from CPA and 100 from OWMR. The housing expediter will get about 6,100 from OPA, while another 125 from OPA will go to RFC.

WAA Priorities End Urged

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—N. Littlejohn Thursday asked congress to wipe out by December 31 priorities on all purchases of surplus property except real estate.

The proposal, designed to speed surplus sales, would eliminate preference now given veterans, states and local governments and non-profit institutions such as schools and hospitals.

Rising national production will make it unnecessary to keep priorities in force beyond the year-end, Littlejohn said, adding:

"It should be borne in mind that priority claimants are interested almost exclusively in 'short supply' items."

"By December 31, the residue of 'short supply' items will be extremely small. This will be due both to reconversion and accelerated disposal."

Real property includes plants, grazing and farm lands, and fixed military installations. In these cases, however, Littlejohn said the 90-day period in which real property is held for its former owners should be cut to 30 days.
