News Behind The News

By PAUL MALLON WASHINGTON, April 25—The Dewey people seem to think the New York governor really launched his candidacy aggressively by capturing the republican national committee meeting in Kansas City. The stories tell of how they surprisingly forced the convention away from Chicago which appeared at the start to have a majority, and took it to Philadelphia.

A canvass of the national committee on this point might deprive them of some cheer. Certain direct sources have assured me the change was not made on a Dewey basis. If a vote had been taken between Governor Dewey and Senator Taft, the result would have been different. The Taft leadership fluctuates in popularity among republicans, as it is grappling with national issues from day to day. The Dewey leadership, on the other hand, is still on a personal basis, that is, based on personal rather than party support. It is not on the firing line.

Shallow Talk FAR more influential in the decision was the desire of the committee to take the convention to a republican city. The republicans held their last convention where Dewey was nominated, in surroundings provided by the democratic domination of the Chicago Civic auditorium. Democrats only recently won another victory in the Chicago mayoralty. Philadelphia happens to be the largest republican city in the country. It will provide friendly and sympathetic atmosphere, at least not democratic suspicion. The choice of the national committee was logical.

Thus the talk and gossip about the decision appear comparatively somewhat shallow. I mean the talk and gossip to the effect that: "We got the convention away from the Chicago Tribune crowd," or "we got it back to a one world city where Willie was nominated," or even "this means Dewey has licked Taft."

The Dewey forces are gleeful over another Kansas City development. Their leaders drew from Chairman Reece (a Taft man they say) a promise he would consider presidential candidacies and geography when he selects the committee on organization and rules and when he selects the convention. The papers said this was "a compromise." They neglected to point out certain facts. The convention generally has a contest from Mississippi, and occasionally some from a few other states in the South. But most republican authorities have long since given the southern delegates to Taft. It was his leadership which forced the Bilbo affair to a head. Certainly no one has given them to Dewey.

Inconclusive FURTHERMORE the committees to be appointed by Reece will be temporary. He has no power to select the permanent committees of the convention. If Reece is at all angry about the Dewey aggressiveness, he could easily resolve his consideration of rules and geography to a point which will not help Dewey.

Thus on this point again, the Dewey victory is hardly conclusive. Certain inner signs are noticeable that the Taft people have become somewhat aroused by the conditional aggressiveness of the Dewey people. The Taft people whisper that the Dewey Senator Ives held back on union reform legislation and somewhat embarrassed the leadership of Taft. The Ives vote, they say, weighed a balance of power in the senate labor committee. The senate republicans will know labor committee for Dewey. If he had taken a stand with the Taft leadership, he could certainly have influenced a number of votes on the floor.

The republicans usually hold in December or January, their national committee meeting to select a convention site, but held this one at least nine months early. The reason, they say, was to make hotel reservations early. If their real reason was to bring an inner condition of the republican party out into the open early, they succeeded.

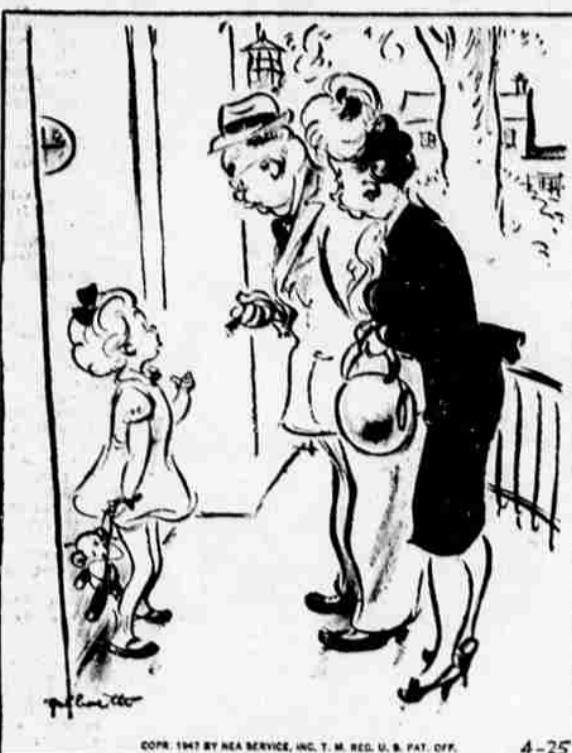

The World Today

The Big Four foreign ministers conference, which assembled at Moscow a month ago to draft a peace treaty, has collapsed in deadlock and so is being recorded as a failure on major points.

Still, nevertheless, the fact that a broader sense we don't have to take such a pessimistic view. The vast deadlock in itself is a mark of vast achievement. It means that the western allies have refused to retreat further in face of the Russian political offensive which already has swallowed a large section of Europe.

Retreat Stopped However, that's water over the dam. The thing which really matters is that the western allies have stopped their retreat. The battle now is likely to be fought on its present lines, with further reinforcement by the American-British-French group which, it's important to note, has been further unified by the trend of the conference.

This means that we are much closer to finding out just what the Moscowite program of expansion is. Up to now there hasn't been any concrete indication of how far Russia has intended to go, and there could be no such indication so long as the other allies continued to appease and retreat. Human nature being what it is, the Soviet Union was bound to keep right on advancing until it encountered an obstruction.

Now as the result of the determined stand by the western group under leadership of General Marshall, Moscow may be expected to show its hand before long. Russia will pursue one of two courses: Either she will make concessions in the interests of putting Europe on its feet, or she will keep right on pressing for control of more territory and more peoples.

You perhaps are asking Russia's silence at this time bodes ill. I don't think it would be wise to try to answer that now. We must recognize that Moscow is suspicious and wants to be satisfied that the western allies have no designs inimical to her.

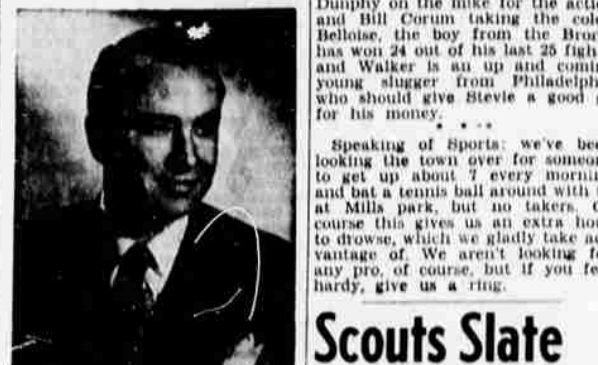

Today's Roundup

KLAMATH FALLS has won a unique distinction, which may not be fully realized locally, in having both of its war-built military installations assured of constructive peace-time use. It is an objective toward which many another community has worked in vain, and there is real reason for local gratification this week as the WAA turns over the Klamath naval air station to the city of Klamath Falls, and the Marine Barracks to the state of Oregon.

That this has come about is due in part to local community effort, for which our civic and official leadership deserves credit and commendation.

It is due in part to the nature of the installations. The Klamath naval air station is primarily an airport; it comes back to the city this week as an airport, tremendously expanded beyond its status at the time it was turned over to the city. Most of this expansion would have been far beyond the capacity of the city to finance. It now boasts many fine facilities which came to it in the period of navy control, and which the city gets with little or no expense. It is one of the best equipped municipal airports in the West.

That is a blessing, but it also presents its problems. The city finds itself with an extensive maintenance program on its hands, and financing this work is going to take the most careful and business-like administration of airport affairs.

It may be found advisable, as the situation develops, to make some use of certain facilities out there for other than strictly aviation purposes. The reclamation bureau is already using buildings and facilities which the city did not seek. It is conceivable, for instance, that the huge double hangar might be useful for national guard activities, or some other purpose for which present facilities may be found inadequate.

Interest Motes

WAA will turn over the Marine Barracks in a few days, and there is no need again to recount that story. It is gratifying to learn from Salem that there is mounting interest in attendance at the vocational and technical school to be established there; if the present trend of registration continues, there seems no doubt that the school will be filled to capacity as its program gets under way beginning in mid-summer.

Here again are certain problems, especially those in connection with the preparation of the plant for school uses. Considerable reconversion work is mapped, and there will be difficulties in getting men and material for these projects. The state vocational education department will need the cooperation of everybody concerned, including union labor, in getting this job done.

Ultimate In Insults

Ex-Cowboy Gets Life Term For Broadhurst Slaying

VALE, Ore., April 25 (AP)—Alvin Lee Williams, 29, the one-time ace cowboy who confessed killing wealthy W. D. Broadhurst, 51, for the love of a red-haired 40-year-old woman, today was just another life-terminator.

His sentence was imposed by Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs yesterday after District Attorney Charles Swan in an unscheduled move asked that the murder charge against Williams be reduced from first-degree to second-degree.

Suit Filed In Auto Wreck

A \$15,000 lawsuit growing out of an automobile smashup on the Lakeview highway last August 11, has been filed with the circuit clerk by Stanley O'Neill. Percy Whetstone is named as defendant.

O'Neill's suit charges that he was a passenger in a car owned by Whetstone at the time of the accident, and was asleep on the back seat. Whetstone, he alleges, allowed the auto to be so negligently driven by an unnamed third party that it left the road doing 65 miles an hour.

O'Neill says that his injuries included a broke vertebrae. The Portland firm of Lord, Anderson and Franklin is representing the plaintiff.

Soil Meeting In Corvallis

District soil conservationists of Oregon met in Corvallis this week to outline cooperative practices for the districts for the remainder of the year.

Servicing the large number of districts created during the past year, was also discussed. There are now 22 districts in Oregon, and eight more in the formative stage. Klamath county has two districts at the present time, Poe valley and Langell valley.

Deschutes county district is now in the formative state and will include a large portion of the irrigated land in the county, probably including 500 farms in the territory for the district.
