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Youth Held For Arson

EUGENE, Ore., April 25 (AP)—Donald Glenn Morgan, 22, was held Thursday on a charge of arson after police and firemen investigated five Tuesday night fires here.

Police headquarters reported Morgan had been released from the veterans hospital at Roseburg 10 days ago where he went voluntarily after being charged with setting five minor New Year's Eve fires here.

Damage by the fires here Tuesday amounted to several hundred dollars to two apartment buildings, one warehouse, an empty home and two cars and two trucks.

Grand Larceny Charge Made

Aubrey Luzzell Mooney, 20, of Hood River, waived a preliminary hearing and was lodged in the county jail yesterday afternoon on a charge of grand larceny. Justice of the Peace J. A. Mahoney set bail at \$500.

Mooney is accused of stealing four wheels, tires and tubes from a car owned by Earl W. Lamb, 435 N. 9th. The car was driven away from Lamb's address April 16 and found stripped and abandoned off the Old Port road three days later.

Mooney had been held in the city jail for several days before being transferred to the county.
