Man Jailed For Polygamy

Robert William Nickelson, 27-year-old mechanic, was arrested by city police this morning and lodged in the county jail on a charge of polygamy. A secret indictment was returned against him by the grand jury last Thursday. Nickelson, according to information from the district attorney's office, is accused of having one wife in Jackson county, Oregon, and another here. He is alleged to have married a girl named Afton Bernice Phelps at Medford on April 12, 1945, and the complaint against him indicates that she is still his legal wife. Then on October 25, 1946, in Washington county, Nevada, Nickelson is said to have married a girl named Betty Lee Shearer. Sometime later they moved to Klamath Falls and lived as man and wife at 1844 Lancaster, the indictment charges. Deputy District Attorney J. H. Napier said that Nickelson's act of bringing the second wife to Oregon to live violated the state's polygamy law, making the charge that instead of bigamy. Nickelson was located just before noon and lodged in the county jail, and his indictment was made public shortly after. No bail has been set in his case.

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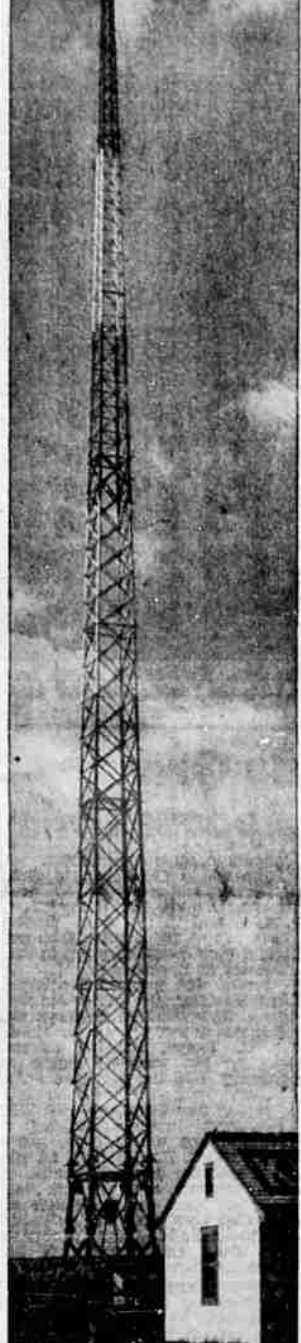
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result only in war. All portents are plainly visible that the American economic system is threatened with a depression, in probability far more serious than the 1929 debacle. Down to World War I depressions were self-healing because the expansion of markets more than compensated for the tendency within capitalism to increase unemployment. But by 1913 this ceased to be the case. When the 1929 crash came it was so serious that the non-capitalistic nation on earth had liquidated unemployment and the overt alliance of economics and politics. Capitalism is an economy of scarcity. Industrialism is the technique of price reduction by an ever greater mass production and expanding market. The New Deal shut off the machine, plowed under the crops and killed the little pigs to restore an economy of scarcity. Due to the war our productive capacity has been increased by 30 per cent, our agricultural output by over 33 per cent. If production and full employment is to be kept up there must be a 50 per cent increase of consumption. The military will take about 10 per cent of our production. Export another 10 per cent at the most. Since 60 per cent of our production must be consumed in the domestic market, it is obvious that

the buying power of the people as a whole must be increased, at least 30 per cent over the prewar era. In other words the living standards of the vast mass of the people must be greatly improved. In a socialistic state this would present no great problem. In a monopoly-capitalistic state such as the United States, the problem is unsolvable except by fascism and eventually war. The U. S. is the only capitalistic nation left in the world. Two-thirds of the human race have swung more or less sharply towards the left. The U. S. must modify its rule or ruin policy both domestic and foreign or face the grim alternative—war. In an atomic war there are no victors. The Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists makes that abundantly clear. Atomic war is global suicide of the human race. In any other type of war we can no more defeat Russia and her allies than I can whip Joe Louis. Wallace is right for once. We ARE making war on Russia. It is the truth that hurts. Wallace was so right that it drove the political kept women into a frenzy—a senile, denture clicking, sputtering rage. The poor, pitiful, mentally ossified refugees from an old peoples home. Little wonder the chaplain looks over the congressional monkey house and then prays for the nation. So do I. ELMER BENNETT.
