Now Ladies—wait a minute! As I said before, I'm only a poor butcher—not a Home Ec major. I can see that I opened my big mouth too wide by my well-meaning offers to help you plan your menus and cook your meat. But then, I wasn't expecting so much response to my offer to help you with suggestions on what to fix for dinner. It looks like I'll have to spend my nights reading a cook book. But I'm glad to do it. Anything to please our customers.

Now here is one of my favorite dishes. This isn't one of those recipes that require a certain amount of this and that, but one that can be made larger or smaller according to the size of your family.

**SHORT RIBS SPANISH**: Start with enough short ribs to serve your family. I suggest 2, cut into three or four pieces each. Put in Dutch oven or large kettle, add a medium sliced onion, salt and pepper and a can of Sun-Best solid pack tomatoes or enough to cover, a pinch or two of Savoury, and simmer over low heat for 1½ hours.
