

# State Beauty Convention Offers Many Highlights

Interesting bits about this and that personage in Klamath Falls for the state convention at the Oregon Association of Beauty Shop Owners and Operators, gleaned Sunday from registration headquarters at the Willard hotel:

Hazel Schumacker of Modesto, Calif., is the first beautician from the West coast to hold a directorship with the National Hairdressers and Cosmetologists and is national representative at the three-day conclave.

Mrs. Schumacker has operated her own shop in Modesto for 20 years, is a member of the Western States Hairdressers council and a past president of the California association. The Modesto unit sponsored a hair style and fashion show on March 17, with models ranging from 20 months to 80 years, about which there has been wide comment on the wonderful cooperation extended by merchants and business men of that city, not only in donations of prizes, but by entering their own models. Mrs. Schumacker has been on a forced vacation for the past six months, recovering from an auto accident, and is "still taking it easy," as she put it. Following her arrival, she was presented with a floral corsage by the Business and Professional Women's club.

Hair Stylist Ricardo Martin from Hollywood is "father of the Charm Schools" and has conducted tremendously successful radio programs on personal analysis. During the convention, Ricardo is holding special classes on hair styling for the operators, but stated soon after his arrival Saturday that if the demand is great enough for private personal analysis here... in other words, the opinion of an authority on what type of hair arrangement is most flattering to the entire you... he will remain the rest of this week.

Ricardo stresses the importance of considering not only the contours of the head, but the entire physical contour, to minimize a woman's least desirable features and bring forth her best. "When a woman knows she looks pleasing to the eyes of others, it raises her poise and self-confidence, and my aim is helping beauticians to become authorities on this themselves, gaining their patrons' confidence, thereby enabling them to do more for a customer individually than merely turning out a perfect hair style. Ricardo pointed out that we're all striving for beauty, and if it weren't for that, if we were completely satisfied with the way we are, there wouldn't be any need for beauty shops, therefore, operators must provide more than just the skill of their fingers to maintain the beauty profession at the high peak it's gained."

Darwin Jones of Portland, is another outstanding Pacific coast hair stylist who is a convention guest. Jones is a member of the Los Angeles...

gees Hairdressers Guild, and rumor has it that he's to do some judging at convention events, but of course that's all supposed to be very hush-hush. Anyway, he is here.

Mary G. Sanger who is covering the convention for the American Hairdressers magazine of which she is representative for Northern California, Oregon and Washington, used to be in radio work in Louisiana, conducting children's programs, and was known as the "fun lady." That was prior to her marriage some ten years ago, after which she moved to the Portland vicinity, then later to California, now making her home in Oakland.

Her first name, by the way, is not Margaret, as previously reported, although she says people are always getting confused over the similarity in the name. Her husband, Harry R. Sanger, is a representative of Inland Printer and of Western Advertiser, and accompanied her to Klamath.

Lucille Kelly, president of the Oregon unit who arrived Sunday morning, owns a shop in Portland and has been active in the beauticians' association for a number of years.

Among past presidents attending the conclave are Gladys Innes, Portland beauty shop owner, now a member of the state board, who has accomplished much in the legislative field of benefit to the association, and Loreta Mae West, also owner of a Portland shop. To these past officers and many others who pioneered for high standards in their profession goes credit for the fact that Oregon now has the highest of any state in the Union, requiring 2500 hours before an operator can be licensed.

Klamath has been well represented on the state board this past year with Delores Korsek, co-owner of Houston's Beauty shop in this city, serving as vice president, in addition to being right-hand assistant to Ethel "Stormy" Borden, president of the Klamath Falls unit and general convention chairman, particularly in the work of financing this three-day meet. Mrs. Borden is owner of the Modernistic shop.

## Juvenile Home Talked By County, City Officers

An important meeting to discuss the treatment and housing of youngsters who have drawn the adverse eye of the law, was held Friday by the juvenile court committee with Judge U. E. Reeder and the county court.

The possibility of developing a decent place with educational and recreational facilities and a home-like atmosphere, for children waiting disposition or transfer to state homes, was the highlight of the session.

The inability of the state of Oregon to keep pace of the need for institutional care of dependent and delinquent children, was pointed out, placing more and more responsibility on the counties.

Although the foster home program still carries a large bulk of the responsibility, the committee, headed by Mrs. M. P. Leonard, emphasized the need for a local program that would be profitable for the children themselves.

The county court was very receptive to the idea.

"These are our children and we want to take care of them ourselves, not shoot them off to some distant place to be experimented on," Judge Reeder stated, asking the committee to cooperate in investigating local possibilities.

One suggestion was to try to get cooperation from the county health unit. It is a long-range program, according to the judge, with a hope to get a place where a really useful out-placing more and more children could be insured to help straighten out problems of the children so that within a limited time they could be returned to their own homes.

A point which was emphasized at the meeting was the lack of state funds to carry on essential plans to curb juvenile delinquency in Klamath county. Cooperation of civic groups and individuals is imperative to make the program workable, the judge pointed out.

## Polygamy Case Still Pending

Bail for Robert William Nickerson, in the county jail on a charge of polygamy, has been set at \$2500, but the 27-year-old mechanic had not been able to post that amount today. Neither had he been arraigned in circuit court.

Nickerson was secretly indicted for polygamy by the grand jury last week, and was arrested Saturday. He is accused of having two wives, one of whom he married in Medford, the other in Nevada.

Courthouse records reveal that on October 24, 1946, Nickerson filed suit for divorce, charging cruelty, from Afton Bernice Phelps, whom he married April 12, 1945, but the suit is still in litigation. Latest court action was an order that Nickerson pay \$75 a month temporary alimony, plus confinement, medical and legal fees.

Nickerson is alleged to have married his second wife, named Betty Lee Shearer, on October 28, just two days after filing the divorce complaint in circuit court here.
