

# Pre-Registration, Job Applications Start At MB Technical Institute

Pre-registration and job applications for the technical institute at the Marine Barracks plant have started.

Harold Teale, vocational supervisor for Klamath Union high school, announced today that pre-registration blanks are available at the chamber of commerce, veterans administration office, Oregon state employment service office, and the vocational office of the high school.

These are the same blanks which were used several months ago in a survey, and those who signed the blanks at that time need not do so again. They do not represent actual registration, which will take place when the program is a little farther along.

Those wishing to apply for jobs either as instructors or in plant operation capacities may do so at the offices which have been established in the gate house building at the front entrance of the Marine Barracks.

Temporarily, the gate house will be headquarters for the state vocational department officials, who are here in connection with opening the school.

Winston Pflurine, who is in charge of the local situation for the state office, was in Salem today, but is expected back tomorrow.

Four men are at work taking an inventory of all property at the Marine Barracks. Under the arrangement with the WAA, certain personal property is to be moved to the Klamath naval air station for storage, but there is a possibility that some arrangement may be made to take this property over for the state.

**IH Offers Employees 15 Cent Wage Boost**

CHICAGO, April 28 (AP)—International Harvester company today offered a 15-cent-an-hour wage increase to 62,000 employees in 21 factories represented by 11 unions, and said the offer would not affect the company's present level of prices.

The huge farm equipment concern last month announced price reductions on its products which it said would mean a \$20,000,000 savings annually to users.

The wage offer, following the passage of wage settlements granted to nearly 1,000,000 workers in the steel, automobile and electrical industries, calls for a general wage increase of 11 1/2 cents hourly plus six paid holidays.

**Brown Buys Fort Klamath Ranch**

Dick Brown of the Brown Equipment company on South Sixth has bought from Mrs. Olena Brisco, a 160-acre ranch at Fort Klamath. He plans to grow clover seed on a considerable part of it. FAIRFIELD, Calif., April 28 (AP)—A B-24 nicknamed the "Flying Boxcar" by the army, will take off tonight for the first trans-Pacific flight by that type of plane to demonstrate its cargo and troop-carrying potentialities to Pacific area occupation forces.

Lt. Col. William F. Mandt will pilot the B-24.

## Complaints Of Modoc Phone Service Heard At Meeting

ALTURAS, April 28—A J. Matthews of Bunsaville, manager of Modoc county telephone lines, met with members of the county chamber of commerce Friday evening to listen to complaints on the service here.

Frank Carpenter, in charge of the R. L. Smith Lumber company's mill and logging operations in Canby, 18 miles west of here, told of times when accidents have happened at the plant. They were unable to get a call through to Alturas for a doctor or the ambulance. He also cited a number of times when long distance calls have taken over 12 hours to complete and in many instances the calls were never completed.

Others voicing their complaints were Moly and Val Dyke manager, Harry Finney, Superior Lumber company, Steve Wistot, Modoc Motors, Stanley Decious, Alturas Motors, Paul Reimer, Shell Oil company, "Mickey" Jones, Farmers Exchange, James Souther, Golden Rule store, Bill Tierney, Modoc hotel, and Dr. Auble, chairman of the county board of supervisors.

Four representatives from Fall River Mills gave a scathing report on the long distance service from their city.

All speakers mentioned the fact that the service had been excellent for the past 10 days. It was 10 days since the chamber had instructed a letter be sent to the state railroad commission calling for an investigation of the phone service here.

Matthews told the assembly that his company had placed an order for cables a long time ago but up to date has been unable to secure any. This, he said, was the cause for the inadequate service on long distance calls and which would be rectified as soon as cables were secured.

The local service, on which many made complaints, was caused, he said, by the company being unable to hire experienced operators owing to the high cost of rent and other living conditions in Alturas. He cited instances where the com-
