THE reclamation bureau budget issues, which have made hot news in Washington and the West for weeks, will go before a senate sub-committee next week.

Not So Bad BUT in general, the proposed interior department budget is not so bad, if we are to take the word of Robert W. Sawyer of Bend, president of the National Reclamation Association, who has been in Washington.

Writing in his Bend Bulletin from the capital, Mr. Sawyer says that the budget is a "pretty good job." Some of the cuts are too drastic, he says, including the \$125,000 item for investigation.

Smaller reclamation projects are not badly hit by the measure, which takes its deepest cuts from such projects as Columbia Basin, Central Valley and Colorado-Big Thompson.

Congressman Lowell Stockman of the second Oregon district was on the house committee which reported out the reduced interior department appropriations.

Mr. Sawyer says that one thing the committee has tried to keep in mind was that the national debt is over a quarter of a trillion dollars and that, as to construction projects, current costs are extremely high.
