

Britain Wins Palestine Move Okay

NEW YORK, April 29 (AP)—Britain won initial approval for setting up a Palestine fact-finding committee today after declaring she could not be expected to "expend blood and treasure single-handed" to carry out United Nations recommendations on the future of the Holy Land.

The 14-nation steering committee of the UN assembly's Palestine session agreed without a formal vote to place the British proposal on the agenda.

Action was deferred until this afternoon on an Arab proposal to add an item calling for immediate Palestine independence.

Egyptian Delegate Mahmoud Hassan Pasha, representing the Arab states, objected to inclusion of the British item on the agenda, but did not challenge the announcement of Assembly President Oswaldo Aranha that the item was approved.

Britain's statement on her attitude toward possible assembly recommendations was given by Sir Alexander Cadogan when India challenged him to give assurances that Britain would abide by UN decisions on Palestine.

New "Airletter" Sheet On Sale

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The post office department today brought out a new international "air letter" mailing sheet.

The "air letter" is a thin sheet of letter size paper with a gummed flap. You write on the sheet and when it is folded and sealed it forms its own stamped envelope.

It sells for 10 cents and will be given air mail handling to any country in the world.

The sheets went on sale at the post office here today and will go on sale throughout the country tomorrow.

Inspection Jobs Open

Federal civil service announces an examination for appointments to inspector and livestock inspector positions in the bureau of animal industry of the department of agriculture.

Persons who desire permanent positions will have an opportunity to file for a civil service examination leading to probational appointment with permanent classified civil service status in meat inspector and livestock inspector positions in the states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

The entrance salaries for these positions range from \$2168.28 to \$3397.20 a year.

Applicants for this examination will be given a written test.

Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 62, except that those age limits may be waived for veterans and under certain conditions for war service indefinite employees.

Army Colonels To Be Demoted

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The army today ordered 640 colonels demoted to lieutenant colonel effective July 1.

The wholesale reduction in rank, applied to both air and ground officers but not including the medical or chaplain corps, is designed to lower the number of colonels during the fiscal year 1948 to 5625.

Of the total to be demoted, 599 will be regular army and 52 non-regular army. Forty-three will be air officers. The war department announcement said that "non-regular officers who decline to accept demotion will be relieved from active duty immediately without prejudice." The proportion of reduction is based on the ratio of regular to non-regular army colonels.

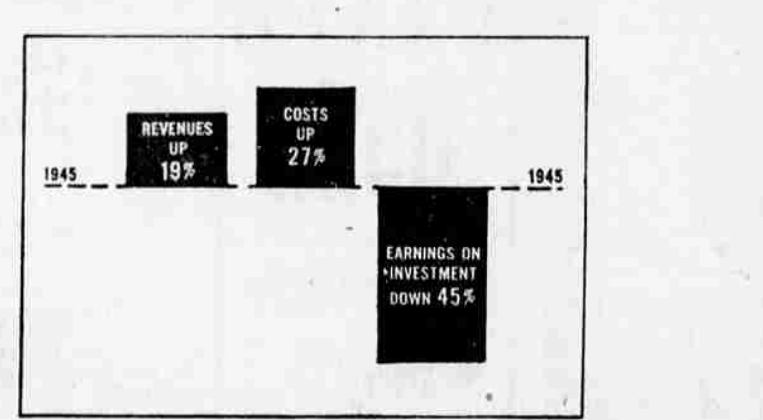
We Are Not Seeking Large Profits
