

India Reopens Palestine Debate With Demand For Jewish Representation

NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—India reopened the Palestine debate here today with a plea to give the Jews a voice in the proceedings of the special assembly of the United Nations.

Noting that the assembly's 14-nation steering committee had heard the spokesmen of five Arab states present their views yesterday, Indian delegate Asaf Ali asked: "Where are the representatives of the Jewish people who will be affected? Where is Palestine?"

He then told the committee as it resumed debate this morning: "We are playing Hamlet without the prince of Denmark."

All referred briefly to statements in the press that he had "taunted" British Delegate Sir Alexander Cadogan yesterday by pressing for an explanation of Britain's intentions toward carrying out U. N. recommendations on Palestine and said "nothing was further from my thoughts."

All declared the Palestine question was a serious question and that it should be approached seriously. All also demanded representation for the Arabs of Palestine.

"I want to hear the Arabs of Palestine," he said. "Where are they? I do not know if my friends have put forward their viewpoint."

Both the British and American delegations were reported opposed to Jewish participation with a "voiceless voice" in the special assembly debate as long as it is solely concerned with the procedural step of setting up an inquiry committee.

PTA Congress In Second Day

PORTLAND, April 30 (AP)—The Oregon congress of Parent-Teacher associations was to elect officers today in the second day session of the annual meeting here.

Mrs. H. H. Harbreaves, Portland, was nominated to the presidency in a speech last night that the state must be ready "to spend millions of dollars if you want education for your children."

"If you don't pay your education bill, what will you do with your money if your youth fail?" he asked the session.

Dr. Paul Packer, chancellor of the Oregon state system of higher education, said that "thoroughness and depth are what we need in education. We don't need to touch on so many subjects. We have too many bits and pieces in our curricula now."
