

Sons Declare Contract Kept

Team Business Manager Says City Official Too Hasty In Charging Neglect of Pact

A charge that the Klamath Sons aren't living up to their agreement to fix up Recreation field for baseball play, made before the city council Monday night by City Building Inspector Walt Salsbery, brought a quick denial from Gino Carnini today. Carnini is handling the baseball team's business affairs for the Sons of Italy lodge.

Salsbery stated specifically that the Sons were using shoddy materials in their construction work, and that no repairs had been made to the existing facilities at the park except to re-roof the grandstand. Salsbery said that the latter was done only at his insistence.

Carnini declared that the Sons were living up to the agreement as fast as the work could be handled, and that the city building inspector had made no inspection of the work on his accusations. He said that the agreement under which the Sons are improving the park was okayed only about a month ago.

Since that time, Carnini said, the Sons have spent about \$600 for labor alone, outside of what work has been done for nothing, and right now owe a \$400 bill for lumber.

The central grandstand has been covered, a grandstand down the base line built, wire netting in front of the stands strengthened, a ramp leading into the main gate built, two ticket windows and the ticket room built.

"No shoddy material was used in any of the building," Carnini said. "Salsbery ok'd the work Saturday morning, before the game (with Medford) Sunday afternoon.

The building inspector has the job of supervising the work at Recreation field. Carnini said that the Sons fully intend to live up to the agreement with the city, but that baseball season doesn't start for almost two weeks yet. Sunday's exhibition game and another coming up next Sunday are being held to raise money to help pay for the work being done at the field.

The agreement between the Sons and the city covers these points:

The Sons agree to build two new grandstands, along first and third base lines, and cover all the grandstands; put the fence around the park in good shape; build two dugouts; set up two ticket booths; if time permits, seed the entire outfield, and maintain the field and grandstand throughout baseball season.

This work was estimated to cost at least \$1400, and in return the Sons are to have use of the park, rent free, on Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday afternoons.

Carnini said today that this work would be done by the Sons. Salsbery's complaint to the city council has been referred to the recreation committee.

ASTORIA, Ore., April 30 (AP)—Oregon's halibut fleet was in offshore fishing waters today for the opening of the international halibut season Thursday.

Packers here reported there was a possibility that boats from the Western Aleutians might unload here instead of Seattle as in past seasons.

Halibut landings here have averaged 400,000 pounds in past years. Meanwhile, salmon fishermen were anchored in the Columbia river for opening of the summer season at noon today, strung from Celilo Falls to the lower waters of the river.

Beavers Land In Second

Los Angeles came out of a ninth inning diamond row and a tenth inning thriller with a 4 to 3 victory over last place Seattle to snatch leadership of the see-saw Pacific Coast league race today.

Portland dropped into second place, a game behind the Angels, by losing to San Francisco, 3 to 1, last night while San Diego found itself tied with Portland after beating Hollywood, 6 to 3. Sacramento also was only a game behind the leaders, having thumped Oakland, 6 to 4.

The Angels' outfielder, Tuck Stainback, tripled with two out in the 10th to send Bill Schuster home with the winning run. In the commotion at the plate Umpire Bob Kober was felled as he and Catcher Bob Siagg collided and had to be helped off the field with a twisted knee.

Two innings accounted for all the scoring in the Portland-San Francisco contest. The Seals got their three in the second on three hits, a long fly and an error. The Beavers counted in the seventh on Eldon Muratore's double and Johnny Raulovich's grounder into center. Bob Joyce beld the Beavers to nine hits, while the Seals got 11.

San Diego knocked out 10 hits as they scored three times in the fifth and three in the seventh while their winning pitcher, Ed Vitahc, held Hollywood scoreless until the stars put on a three-run, too-late rally in the ninth after two were out.

At Maine: (capacity 3200) he can protest that he's a "loyal outsider." Because only students, faculty and local outsiders can get into the arena.

At Kentucky: One-third of the 3000 seats go to "public friends of the university," the rest to students. At South Carolina: Five hundred of the 4500 seats go to the public; students get the rest.

At Virginia Poly Tech, Kansas State, UCLA, and Texas A&M; there's no public sale. Well, where can he go? Colorado? He might try for the 50 seats sold to the public out of a 4200 capacity. Denver: It's students first, and the public gets what's left in the last 30 minutes before game time. New Mexico? He gets shut out of the preliminary game, but he can take his chances in the ticket line 45 minutes before game time. Oregon State? Last season's even. Football Coach Lon Stiner often couldn't get into the 2600-capacity cheseebox to see the Pacific coast champions.

If his eyes are going to be upon Texas, he'll have to risk it 15 minutes before game time. His best bet would seem to be: At Annapolis, if he can get away in the afternoon to see Middies. Free, too, except on Saturday. At Washington, he gets into the Chicago stadium (capacity 22,534).

At Minnesota, where 10,000 seats go to students, and 5500 to the public. At the University of Washington in Seattle, where the pavilion was increased from 9500 to 14,000 capacity.

College Hires Another Coach

ELENSBURG, April 30 (AP)—Central Washington college had its third head football coach in two years today with the appointment of L. E. Reynolds, Missoula, Mont., high school mentor.

The new mentor assumes both football and track coaching duties. He succeeds John Londahl who resigned last month to accept an army commission.

Castoffs Belabor Horsehide

Castoffs Johnny Mize, Eddie Lake and Ed Stanky were licking their chops today following "vengeance victories" over their former bosses. Mize, traded by the St. Louis Cardinals to the New York Giants in 1941, homered with two aboard in the third at the Polo grounds yesterday to start the Giants to a 7-2 victory over his former mates.

The slugging first baseman has made only eight hits this season, but seven of them have been home runs.

Young Monte Kennedy went the route for the Giants, who vacated the National league cellar in favor of the world champion Redbirds. The Cards now have lost six straight, their longest losing streak in seven years.

Eddie Lake, the pint-sized Detroit shortstop who was obtained from the Boston Red Sox following the '45 season, banged today's victory over a triple, and scored three runs to help the Tigers defeat his former mates 8-3 in Detroit. Lake slid home on a double steal and also scored all the way from second on a caught foul fly.

Stanky, the firebrand Dodger second baseman who was shipped to Brooklyn by the Chicago Cubs in 1944, highlighted a seven-run inning with a two-run double to aid the Dodgers in a 10-6 victory over the Bruins at Ebbets field. Stanky also singled and scored two runs. The victory increased the league-leading Dodgers' margin to two games over second-place Chicago.

Outfielder Hal Peck of Cleveland hid his best to beat his former Philadelphia mates by belting a homer and a single, scoring twice and driving in another run to account for all the Indians' rallies in Cleveland. But the Athletics, led by Heinie Majeski, former New York Yankee and Boston Brave, and George Binks, ex-senator from Washington, eked out a 4-3 win.

Other "discarded" gentes who fared well yesterday included Hank Greenberg, celebrated Detroit cast-off, and Bob Elliott, Pittsburgh's gift to Boston.

Elliott hit three and scored once.
