

Leatherneck History Slated

Former "devil dog" of the famous second marine division are asked to give their whereabouts and other information in connection with a history to be published covering events of this fighting unit in the late war, George E. Handy, director of the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs, disclosed today.

A letter to the Oregon veterans' department from marine corps headquarters in Washington said the history will be distributed free to all personnel who were members of the division between January 4, 1942, and September 2, 1945.

All such former members were asked to submit to the Second Marine Division History Board, Room 2120, Headquarters, U. S. Marine Corps, Washington 25, D. C., the following information:

Name, rank and serial number; present address; inclusive dates of their service with the division; unit within the division to which they were attached; and specific incidents or actions which they believe should be included in the history when published.

D. M. Shoup, colonel, U. S. Marine Corps, is president of the board compiling the history.

Churchill Turns Out To Be Top Rating Artist

LONDON, May 1 (AP)—A mysterious landscape painter who turned out to be Winston Churchill had London's art world agog today.

Under the name of "Mr. Winter"—of whom no art judge ever had heard—the cigar-smoking amateur submitted two canvases to the Royal Academy, Britain's foremost gallery, and hoped, probably half-heartedly, that they'd be good enough for a spot in its annual exhibition.

Only art's elite ever made the grade, but both of "Mr. Winter's" entries were accepted.
