

Local Youths Enter Tourney

Two local grade school youngsters will be sent to Portland May 19 to represent Klamath Falls in a Young Oregonians marble tournament during the sports show at the Pacific International Exhibition building.

The 20-30 club will sponsor the youngsters on their Portland trip. Yesterday afternoon at Roosevelt school three lads emerged winners in three different age classes of marble-shooting, and two of the three will be chosen in a playoff for the Portland jaunt.

In class A shooting yesterday—boys of 13 years, seven months or older—LeRoy Schmeck of Pelican school outshot the field and won the first place trophy put up by Matt Finnigan. LeRoy beat Ralph Austin of Mills, two games to one, for the title.

Class B—boys less than class A age but over 10 years 7 months—winner was Robert Thornton of Fairview. He defeated Douglas Pence of Riverside, two games to one, for the first-place prize donated by The Gun store.

CPA Okays Tule Building

TULELAKE, May 1—Approval of the civilian production administration at Washington has been given for construction of a public tile building on Main street to be occupied when completed by Boyd and Fausett, electrical contractors and electric appliance dealers, it was announced Tuesday by Ralph Fausett, member of the firm. The building will be built by Elmer Balsiger, Klamath Falls, on a 268 foot frontage between the Red and White grocery and the Balsiger garage.

Knife And Fork Club Hears "Tune Detective" At Meet

Dr. Sigmund Spaeth, tune detective, ably illustrated his theme, "Music For Fun," to 225 persons attending the Knife and Fork club dinner Wednesday night at the Willard.

Dr. Spaeth put music, "the organization of sound toward beauty," as he defines it, on the same plane with baseball games where anyone can enjoy it. He showed how the movies have helped to make classical, or "permanent" music as he prefers to call it, popular today.

"Taking a few bars from a song hit as a clue, the tune detective traced it by devious pathways to its lair, and in many cases several lairs. Using snatches of songs to illustrate his talk, he revived old favorites, bringing back memories from long-gone years. He cast his musical crumbs about throughout the evening, having as much fun as his audience, and leaving an appetite for a great deal more music.

The doctor played tunes upside down, backwards and forwards, interpersing his program with anecdotes of great composers. He explained the pattern of music as rhythm, tune and melody.

Just like a murder mystery detective, Dr. Spaeth is called upon by the witness stand to testify in lawsuits, where a composer is accused of stealing someone's song. By his detecting he can usually prove that the bars could have been flched from too many sources, if they were "stolen" at all, since all music written must be made from the same old materials.

Many music writers conscientiously believe their music has been stolen but many others are only trying to cash in on another's success, he explained. He has just come from a suit against Cole Porter and when he returns to New York will take the stand in a suit against Frank Sinatra and others.

The speaker thoroughly answered questions in the open meeting following the regular session, taking his time and going into detail for every question asked. He showed how anyone can compose using telephone numbers as the theme, with numbers corresponding to the letters of the scale. His own New York telephone number provides the inspiration for his theme song used on a radio broadcast.

Dr. Spaeth was introduced by John Ashley, presiding at the meeting, who was introduced by Vera Owens, president of the Knife and Fork club. Ashley also introduced the other guests at the speaker's table.
