

# U. S. Navy Ships Visit Istanbul

ISTANBUL, May 2 (AP)—Warships of American and Turkish navies thronged today in the historic Dardanelles strait as four U. S. vessels arrived for a four-day visit to Turkey.

The American forces were led by the 27,000-ton USS Leyte, first aircraft carrier to pass through the strait. Turks rowed, saluted and motioned out in small boats to get a close look at the ships, which also included the light cruiser Dayton and the destroyers Purdy and Bristol.

**Flagship Salute**  
The first salute guns were fired by the Dayton, flagship of Vice Admiral Bernhard H. Bieri, commander of the U. S. naval forces in the Mediterranean. The salute was answered by the guns of the old Turkish port. Bieri then shifted his flag to the Leyte. U. S. Ambassador Edwin C. Wilson came aboard, and on his departure was given a 19-gun salute.

Salutes also were fired for Vice Admiral Mehmet Ali Ugen, commander in chief of the Turkish fleet, several of whose units anchored off Istanbul to greet the American force.

As the Turkish warship Yavuz, flying an American flag in welcome, slowly passed the Leyte, the destroyers aboard both vessels lined the docks at attention.

On the short crowds gathered to watch the American ships, which three days ago completed a week of strenuous maneuvers and exercises with five other warships of the U. S. Mediterranean task force.

# Police Finish Training

All members of the Klamath Falls city police force received certificates of proficiency after completing an eight-week regional police school yesterday.

The school, held at the police headquarters and practical ever held for peace officers in Oregon, was backed by the state board of vocational education, with the federal bureau of investigation, Portland police, Multnomah county sheriff and state police furnishing instructors.

The FBI instructor gave the local police a tough workout, according to Assistant Chief Leigh Ackerman, going through all the steps of making an investigation and the preservation of evidence, finishing off with a mock trial yesterday.

Items of the latest crime-detecting equipment, loaned by the FBI, were used during the training.

Other phases of police work covered during the class sessions included report writing, mechanics of search and arrest, law of search and seizure and law of arrest.

Ackerman said that he was certain the Klamath Falls police force benefited greatly from the professional courses and that the effect of the schooling would be mirrored in better police work.

**Motor Caravan Backs Price Cut**  
PORTLAND, May 2 (AP)—A motor caravan of Portland shoppers to suburban Multnomah was being organized today by the Oregon democratic women in support of the 10 per cent price slash program started by 41 merchants there.

**Two Lose Pilot Licenses**  
PORTLAND, May 2 (AP)—A Hillsboro flight operator has been deprived of his pilot's license for six months on a charge of violating civil aeronautics authority regulations.

Alexander Lamb, Washington, D. C., CAA examiner who heard the case here, reported Leonard Orin Koberstein was charged by CAA inspectors with flying passengers for hire at night from the Hillsboro airport without required lights.

Koberstein pleaded not guilty and has appealed the examiner's ruling. In another hearing, the examiner lifted the license of Peter Vanguard, Portland, on a charge of "buzzing" a residential area. Vanguard waived his right for an appeal.

# Requestfully Yours Marks First Anniversary May Day

Time was, just a year ago yesterday, May 1, when Chuck Cecil first gave out over KFLW with his "Requestfully Yours" program and was hard pressed to fill in the allotted time. Things came to such a pass those first couple of days that Chuck invented a few requests from Lilly Olcott and Sammy Softie, and then he was under way.

Today, just one year and a day from the hour that "Requestfully Yours" was beamed to KFLW listeners, Chuck is just as hard pressed to keep up with the demands. He took time out May 1, anniversary day for the program, to count the year-long stack of mail and found a total of 7229 letters and postcards requesting tunes over the program.

Mail came from West Virginia, North Carolina, Texas, Missouri, the state of Washington, Hawaii, Oklahoma and Taingtao, China, not mentioning the thousands from all over the Klamath basin. These requests from far away places were dedicated to local listeners.

Other figures compiled by Chuck Cecil—6576 requests have been answered, 260 requests are backlogged and will be answered later, and 383 requests have been made for tunes not in "Requestfully Yours." Eleven requests failed to list selections.

Seventy per cent of the requests were for popular tunes, 2 per cent for classics and the remainder for western selections. Most requested tunes this year was "Always," second was "To Each His Own," third, "Remember Me" (the western version); fourth, "Men That Comes Around," fifth, "California Polka," and sixth, "I Don't Know Why."

The most requested tune according to Cecil, that the KFLW library cannot accommodate is "You Are My Sunshine" by the Vaagabonds. The show makes no substitutions, Chuck explained.

Chuck gave as the reason 260 requests are not answered is due to the excessive amount of mail received daily. One week mail averaged a little over 50 letters and postcards each day, and it is not unusual for Chuck to receive over 60 requests in a single day.

When first aired, the program was only 15 minutes long and heard only on week days. Now it runs six days a week with 45 minutes on week days and an hour and a half on Saturdays. The program is designed to air as much music as possible in a given time, with talk and dead air cut down to a minimum. An average of 14 selections are played in a 45-minute period.

# Fire Sweeps Over Batavia Docks

# Steel Plant Merger Seen

PITTSBURGH, May 2 (AP)—With 25,000 of its members idled by scattered strikes principally in non-basic steel plants, the CIO-United Steelworkers union today was faced with a declaration by an industry spokesman that small companies might be "driven into mergers" by the union's bargaining tactics.

Miles H. Knowles of Washington, general counsel for the non-basic steel coordinating committee, last night at Detroit declared that the U. S. steel settlement with the union April 21 was "in no way based upon conditions in fabricating plants."

Of the 25,000 idle workers, the largest group, 12,000, was in a basic steel plant, Inland Steel corporation, at Indiana Harbor, Ind., where workers walked out because they had no contract, although negotiations continued.

The other 13,000 walked out at a score of fabricating plants in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, New Jersey and Ohio.

# Lightning Strikes SPOKANE School Roof

SPOKANE, May 2 (AP)—Lightning hit a corner of the Lewis and Clark high school roof during a severe electric storm early today, tearing out a section 15 feet long and throwing bricks and masonry into the street.

Principal A. L. Parker said the only casualty was a canary which had built a nest in the cornice.

Most of the debris was cleared away before classes opened.

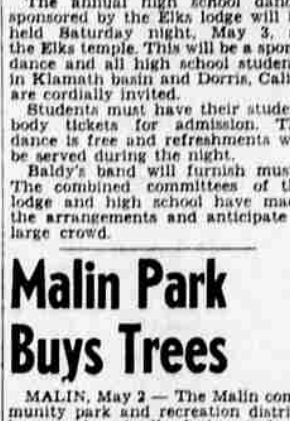

# Nelson Says Inadequate Pay Is Resignation Reason

The legislature's failure to okay a pay increase which was approved by the Klamath county budget committee was given by Newton B. Nelson as his reason for resigning the office of tax assessor.

Klamath county has had money budgeted to give its elective officials a \$50 a month pay boost, retroactive to July 1, 1946, and contingent upon legislative action.

However, the legislature during its recent session did not approve the retroactive feature of the county proposal. A \$50 a month raise for the various elective officers was granted, to begin this coming July 1.

In other words, \$600 for each officer, money which the county has and has earmarked for the retroactive salary raises, cannot be used for that purpose.

Nelson said that he needed to go into better-paying work, and had held up making a decision until after the legislature acted on the pay boost.

The assessor's job now pays \$325 a month. With the pay boost coming July 1 it will pay \$375.

Nelson's resignation is effective July 1, and so far the county court has given no inkling of a possible successor. The court will appoint someone to serve in the capacity of assessor, either until the 1948 general election, or for the full three and a half years of Nelson's unexpired term.

Nelson said he did not care to disclose the nature of the work he will go into, but said that he will stay in Klamath Falls.
