RENO, Nev. May 8 (AP)—Francis R. (Pank) Smith, Reno concrete contractor, was elected to a four-year term as mayor of Reno yesterday.

Smith polled 5225 votes, against 3472 for G. A. Rogers, and 901 for Pat McCarthy.

The voters approved, 5161 to 3736 a proposal to adopt a city manager form of government.

At a recent meeting the faculty of Klamath Union high school voted unanimously to go on record as favoring the Oregon sales tax bill

Meters Take In \$14,240

Motorists have dropped \$14,240.50 in pennies, nickels and dimes into parking meters since the installation of the clockers on January 25, reports Paul Otterbein, collector.

Along with the coins, Otterbein has gathered in everything from slugs to hairpins and chewing gum. The dimes generally balance the slugs, he adds. Motorists persist in plugging dimes in the slots, probably on the assumption that they will get two hours of parking, but dimes will not register in the machines.

Salmon Fishing Good This Year

ASTORIA, Ore., May 8 (AP)—William Larson, Jr., of the U. S. fish and wildlife service here, reported today that Astoria anglers received 222,938 pounds of chinook on the first two days of the 1947 spring season on the Columbia river. Compared to 1946, most fishermen who fished the upriver and middle river drifts were lucky. Last year only 185,800 pounds were reported during the first two days.

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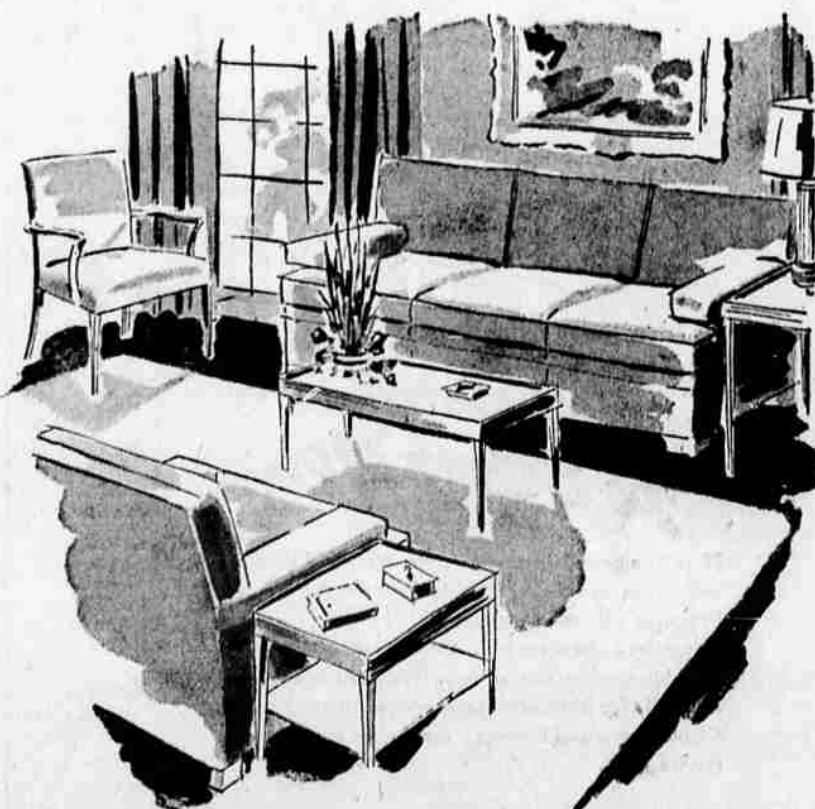
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
