Teachers' desks were piled high with blossoms—tulips, lilacs, pansies, spirea and early iris—as the time honored observance of May Day took place on Thursday morning, May 1. 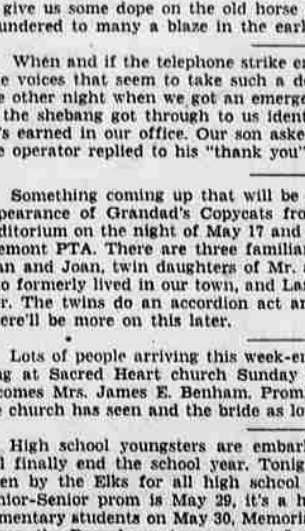

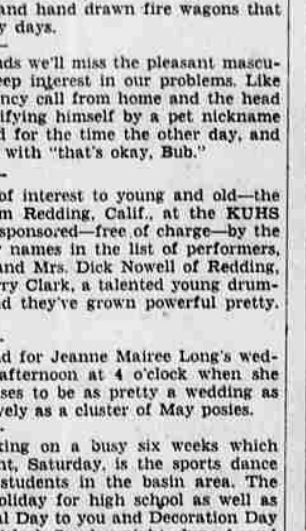
