St. Paul's Episcopal church was the scene for the nuptials read by the Rev. Frederick C. Wissenbach before a large gathering of friends and relatives of the young couple. Tapers in candelabra lighted the church, and placed at the altar were palms and baskets of white snapdragons.

Mariann Sexton sang "Through the Years," and her sister, Mary Lou Sexton, who came here from the University of Oregon at Eugene to be present for the ceremony, sang "Because" as guests assembled. Mrs. D. J. Zumwalt played the Lohengrin wedding march as the bridal party entered the church, as well as the traditional Mendelssohn recessional.

Wedding Bells

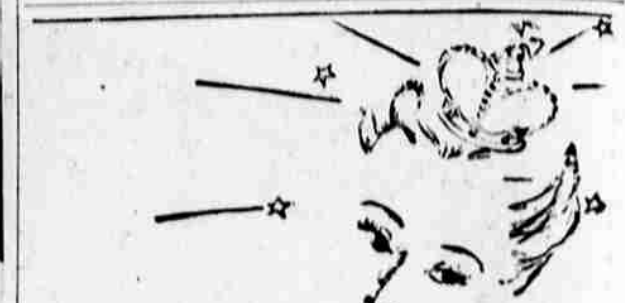
