Foss Operates Flying School

Joe Foss, marine corps air ace who was stationed for a time at the Klamath Falls Marine Barracks after returning from his second tour of overseas duty, is now back in his home town of Sioux Falls, S. D., operating a flying school and farm.

Foss was a major when stationed here. In the early days of the war he shot down 26 Japanese planes during the battle for Guadalcanal, and was awarded the Congressional Medal.

Since returning to civilian life, Foss has resigned his marine corps commission and been appointed a lieutenant colonel in the South Dakota national guard. He commands the 32nd service group, the 175th weather squadron and the 175th fighter squadron, which are equipped with P-51 Mustangs.
