

Certificates Not Accepted

No further applications for housing expediter certificates or requests for renewals will be accepted at the regional office of the housing expediter, New West Life building, Seattle, Charles C. Bayles, locality housing expediter, announced.

Applications for certificates or renewals submitted prior to May 1 will be processed as usual he said. The certificates were issued to persons and companies contributing to the veterans housing program to give them priority in securing surplus equipment from war assets administration. The certificates are valid for 60 days from date of issuance.

The regional office in Seattle covering Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and Alaska has processed 2182 applications and issued 6546 certificates. Renewals totaled 220. Applications now being processed total 327.

Much surplus equipment has been secured by certificate holders during recent months including tractors, trucks, cranes, power shovels, road graders, air compressors and rock crushers for use in logging, lumbering, home construction, street and sewer work and other operations benefitting the housing program.

Vets Wives Live Rugged Life In Trailer Section

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., May 5 (AP)—The other wives at "the hatchery," campus nickname for Indiana university's trailer home community for war vets—just couldn't understand the viewpoint of little Mrs. Vivian Bolinger.

"I wish George would stay for a year of graduate work after getting his degree," she said. Wonderingly the word swept through the other remodeled wartime trailers, lined up in neat rows by the hundreds west of the university stadium. "Vivian wants George to stay another year."

Most veterans and their wives, particularly those with children, want to move on as soon as the family head wins his sheepskin. They want to leave their cramped quarters and get started somewhere in new homes.

Vivian—she is pretty and red-haired and her husband calls her "Curly"—is an exception. Life is crowded in their small \$25-a-month trailer but it has been happy.

"And I just hate the thought of trying to find another place to live," sighed Curly. Like the wives of many veterans she has an outside job to help eke out the government educational allowance of \$90 a month. She doesn't mind working.

Most veterans to remain in school have had to borrow from relatives or spend their wartime savings. Curly's husband, a journalism student who worked in Gary steel mills before spending 18 months in the Pacific, is 29. He's anxious to get started in a newspaper career.

So is his pal, Joe Ginzery, 24. Indianapolis, a former airforce gunner in the European theater. Joe

shares a \$32.50 trailer with his wife, Pamela, and their three children. Nelson is 4 years old and the twins, Walter (Red) and Joe (Blue) are two. Walter is dressed in red and little Joe in blue so each can tell himself from the other.

The three Ginzery children swarm over the 18-by-20-foot trailer like a trio of healthy, husky bear cubs. Their mother, a large friendly girl of placid temperament, has to pack them off to the community nursery when she wants to do housecleaning.

"It makes a big difference in my wife's disposition whether the kids get to nursery school or not," grinned Joe.

Pamela cooks on a small gas stove, finds housework something of

a chore because the trailers have no running water. It has to be packed about 15 feet from a community outdoor faucet. The families also must use community laundry and toilet facilities.

"I don't mind carrying the water in," said Pamela, "but I do get tired of having to carry it back out after housecleaning just to throw it away."

Pamela is studying a college course on "personal adjustment and family living." She likes it, and just laughed when I asked her if she didn't think she already knew more about that subject than the professor.

She said the wives get along well and help each other in many ways. "I feel I can stick it out until my husband gets through college," she said. The Ginzerys and Bolingers said they knew of only one veteran and his wife who had failed to stay until the husband completed his university work.

Idle Pay Fund Gets Refund

With hundreds of doubtful claims constantly being checked and re-checked for possible "chiseling," workers have repaid to the Oregon unemployment compensation commission \$75,887, well over half of the \$140,135 in over-payments set up in the past nine years, it was reported today by Administrator Silas Gaiser.

Of the total more than \$50,000 was collected by the commission on pre-war claims, while about \$10,000 already has been returned by those laid off since the end of hostilities. Investigations proceeded throughout the war, but both benefits and repayments were extremely low.

"While we have not had the personnel available to re-check every one of the 103,000 claims filed in 1946 and as many more in 1945 or 1947, a goodly proportion have been through our readjustment unit," commented Mr. Gaiser. "This is a constant process—in addition to all the usual controls at the local office and central office levels."

Of a recent group of 8000 claims re-checked, a thousand were held for further investigation. Minor adjustments resulted in 61 cases, some with refunds while 22 came up for prosecution.

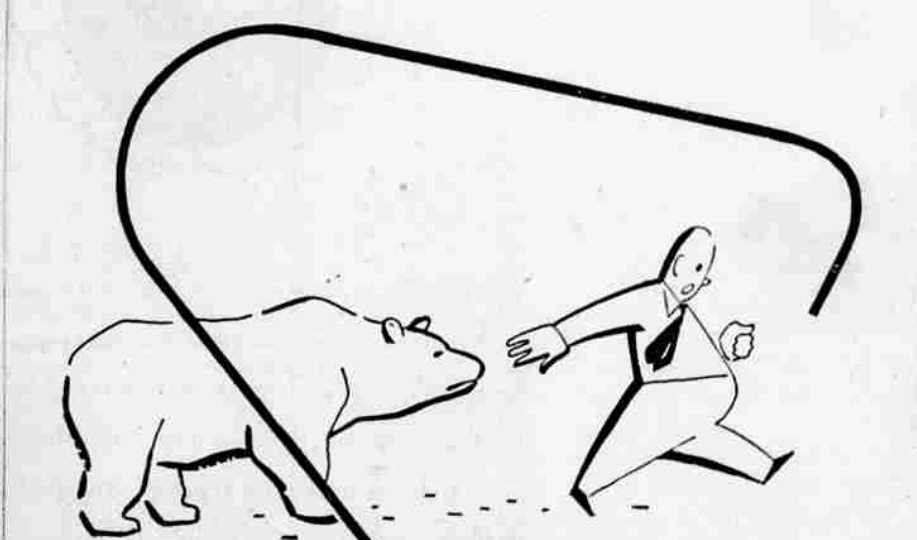
