

# Queen Rules Over High School Prom

CHILOQUIN—The coronation of Elene Pohl as junior-senior prom queen marked the climax of a successful dance in a beautiful setting at the Chilquin high school gymnasium on Saturday evening, May 3. Entering on the arm of her escort, Junior Class President Jack Jones, the queen was followed by her three senior princesses, Gleta Mathis, Bonnie Glendon and Mary Monks, and their escorts, Bill Wampler, Howard Luderman and Ray Severson. The elected royalty were preceded by flower girls, Todd and Tanya Sche, first graders, who were attired, as were the senior girls, in white, and by Crown Bearer David Mahrt. John Acomb performed the honors of introducing the girls and crowning the queen.

Queen Elene, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Pohl and the fifth of their children to graduate from Chilquin high school, is a blonde, blue-eyed 17-year-old. Although so young, she is perfectly capable of earning her own living. She was much in demand in former years as a singer and in the last two summers worked in a grocery store and for over a year has worked in the local theatre. Last summer Elene held both jobs and still found time to help her working mother by doing housework, although sister Alice Marie, who helped her classmates to prepare the elaborate decorations, carried most of that responsibility. The queen's future plans include a business course in Sacramento where she will stay with her brother, Norman, and his family.

The queen found a royal setting for her reign. The juniors under the direction of the instructor, Richard Wilson, chose "the open book" as their theme. An eight-foot replica of an open book which bore the names of the seniors and their motto "We Finish to Begin," formed the center of interest. It was surrounded by a low flower-decorated lattice work fence and highlighted by a crepe paper trimmed chandelier suspended from the false ceiling of blue and silver. Flower trimmed lattice-work and arched gates surrounded the floor.

## Chicago Milk Strike Settled

CHICAGO, May 7 (AP)—A milk strike which cut off the flow of 90 per cent of dairy products normally consumed in Chicago and its suburbs was settled Tuesday.

Settlement was announced jointly by the Associated Milk Dealers, Inc., and local 754 of the AFL Dairy Employees union after 12 hours of continuous negotiations.

The agreement prescribed a 44 hour week for which pay was fixed at \$64.16 until Nov. 1, 1947, after which a 40-hour week with pay at \$60.16 will become effective. Adjustments for Sunday work were also made. Previously, a 48-hour week was in effect, with pay of \$60.16.
