**Queen Will Fly**  
A fishing trip on Upper Klamath Lake with a light on a Republic Seabee on Saturday, May 10, is being offered to Mrs. Guy Williamson who has been chosen "Queen For a Day" in Hollywood. Mrs. Williamson is being held over in Klamath Falls for an extra day to take in this trip, sponsored by Lakeland Flying Service. Her companion will accompany her and there will be a photographer on the amphibious plane besides, of course, the pilot who will be Penny Payne.

The queen will leave the airport on the Seabee at 9 a.m. Saturday and return in time to make connections out of town.

**Invention in Production**  
Jack Tilman, inventor of the Tilman Navigator, has resigned from the city police force to devote his full time to production of his navigating device which is expected to be on the market within a couple of weeks.

During April 495 pounds of airmail left by United Air Lines from Klamath Falls and 476 pounds were delivered here, showing an increase over March airmail. There was an increase in passenger travel also with 1650 passengers boarding the plane here and 1350 coming into Klamath Falls during April.

**House Members Ask Old Age Pension Up**  
WASHINGTON, May 7 (AP)—Eleven house members were united today in a bipartisan effort to increase old age pensions and make them uniform throughout the nation.

At a meeting in the office of Rep. Landis (R-Ind.) they drafted a letter appealing to the house ways and means committee to take up such legislation in time to assure it of "thorough consideration."

The present national average Landis said is \$21.15, with \$33.93 in Washington the highest and \$12.02 in Kentucky the lowest. Federal contributions now have to be matched by the states.

Landis listed the others who signed the letter as including Angell (R-Ore.).
