

Chambers Marks Up Sixth Win

Los Angeles, May 7 (AP)—Chambers, a 14-hit, 3-homer pitcher, gave the Angels a 12 to 6 victory last night in the first of the intra-city series.

Cliff Chambers of Bellingham marked up his sixth pitching victory for the Angels, with no losses, giving up nine hits but holding an increasing lead after the second inning. MEASURE WOULD HALT GRAZIANO-ZALE FIGHT

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 7—Representative Harold R. Blomstrand of Chicago, a republican member of the Illinois lower house, has introduced a bill in the legislature aimed at stopping the Tony Zale-Rocky Graziano middleweight championship

fight scheduled for July 16 in Chicago. The measure, as written, would prohibit any dishonorably discharged veteran of the armed forces from obtaining or holding a license to box or wrestle in the state of Illinois.

Blomstrand charged that Graziano was jailed for almost a year while in the armed forces for fighting illegally, and was dishonorably discharged from the service.

"This bill is aimed at stopping millionaire promoters in staging the Graziano fight," he declared, asserting that he would push the legislation through as quickly as possible.

A bill has already been prepared for the Illinois senate to bar fighters from the state who have been barred from other states, and Blomstrand accused "outside pressure groups" of blocking introduction of that bill.
